### Definitions of "Trophy" as a noun


According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “trophy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An award for success in war or hunting.*
- *(in ancient Greece or Rome) the weapons of a defeated army set up as a memorial of victory.*
- *A cup or other decorative object awarded as a prize for a victory or success.*
- *A souvenir of an achievement, especially a part of an animal taken when hunting.*
- *Something given as a token of victory.*



## Synonyms of "Trophy" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>cup</b>	The contents of a cup. <i>A <b>cup</b> of tea.</i>
<b>keepsake</b>	Something of sentimental value. <i>She was wearing the medal he gave her as a <b>keepsake</b>.</i>
<b>medal</b>	A metal disc typically of the size of a large coin and bearing an inscription or design, made to commemorate an event or awarded as a distinction to someone such as a soldier or athlete.
<b>memento</b>	An object kept as a reminder of a person or event. <i>You can purchase a <b>memento</b> of your visit.</i>
<b>prize</b>	Something given for victory or superiority in a contest or competition or for winning a lottery. <i>The star <b>prize</b> in the charity raffle.</i>
<b>record</b>	Sound recording consisting of a disk with a continuous groove used to reproduce music by rotating while a phonograph needle tracks in the groove. <i>The track <b>record</b> shows that he will be a good president.</i>
<b>relic</b>	An antiquity that has survived from the distant past. <i>Miracles wrought by the <b>relics</b> of St Stephen.</i>
<b>reminder</b>	A letter sent to remind someone of an obligation, especially to pay a bill. <i>Her mushroom omelette is a blissful <b>reminder</b> of Sunday suppers.</i>
<b>souvenir</b>	A thing that is kept as a reminder of a person, place, or event. <i>The recording provides a <b>souvenir</b> of a great production.</i>

<b>accomplishment</b>	The action of accomplishing something. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable <b>accomplishment</b>.</i>
<b>achiever</b>	A person who achieves a high or specified level of success. <i>His children are <b>achievers</b> destined to follow an exacting academic route.</i>
<b>acquisition</b>	An asset or object bought or obtained, typically by a library or museum. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of one company by another.</i>
<a href="#">award</a>	Give, especially as an honor or reward. <i>He criticized the <b>awarding</b> of compensation by the court.</i>

<b>championship</b>	The position or title of the winner of a championship contest. <i>The final round of the <b>championship</b> will be in Japan.</i>
<b>competition</b>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>He wanted to know what the <b>competition</b> was doing.</i>
<b>congratulation</b>	The action of expressing congratulations. <i>Our <b>congratulations</b> to the winners.</i>
<b>giveaway</b>	Inadvertently revealing something. <i>Bread at <b>giveaway</b> prices.</i>
<b>honored</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
<b>honour</b>	The quality of being honorable and having a good name. <i>They <b>honoured</b> their parents in all they did.</i>
<b>jubilation</b>	A feeling of great happiness and triumph. <i>Unbelievable scenes of <b>jubilation</b>.</i>
<b>laureate</b>	Worthy of the greatest honor or distinction. <i>The nation's pediatrician <b>laureate</b> is preparing to lay down his black bag.</i>
<b>lottery</b>	Players buy (or are given) chances and prizes are distributed by casting lots. <i>The introduction of a national <b>lottery</b>.</i>
<b>marathoner</b>	Someone who participates in long-distance races (especially in marathons).
<b>medal</b>	Decorate or honour with a medal. <i>They <b>medalled</b> in all the relay events.</i>
<b>nobel</b>	Swedish chemist remembered for his invention of dynamite and for the bequest that created the Nobel prizes (1833-1896).
<b>pentathlon</b>	An athletic event comprising five different events for each competitor in particular also modern pentathlon an event involving fencing shooting swimming riding and cross country running.
<b>prestigious</b>	Exerting influence by reason of high status or prestige. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> professor at a <b>prestigious</b> university.</i>
<b>prize</b>	Having been or likely to be awarded a prize in a competition. <i>A <b>prize</b> bull.</i>
<b>pugilist</b>	Someone who fights with his fists for sport.
<b>raffle</b>	Offer as a prize in a raffle. <i>We <b>raffled</b> off a trip to the Bahamas.</i>
<b>success</b>	An attainment that is successful. <i>He does not consider wealth synonymous with <b>success</b>.</i>

<b>treasure</b>	Be fond of; be attached to. <i>The ransom was to be paid in diamonds and <b>treasure</b>.</i>
<b>triumph</b>	Dwell on with satisfaction. <i>They had no chance of <b>triumphing</b> over the Nationalists.</i>
<b>victor</b>	The contestant who wins the contest. <i>There were many dead on the field but no clear <b>victor</b>.</i>
<b>victory</b>	A successful ending of a struggle or contest. <i>Convincing <b>victory</b>.</i>
<b>win</b>	Win something through one's efforts. <i>He was happy to get the <b>win</b>.</i>
<b>winner</b>	A goal or shot that wins a match or point. <i>A Nobel Prize <b>winner</b>.</i>
