### Definitions of "Truce" as a noun

- *A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms.*

### Synonyms of "Truce" as a noun (6 Words)

<a href="#">armistice</a>	A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms. <i>The Italian government signed an <b>armistice</b> with the Allies.</i>
<b>cease-fire</b>	A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms.
<b>ceasefire</b>	A temporary suspension of fighting; a truce. <i>The latest <b>ceasefire</b> seems to be holding.</i>
<b>cessation of hostilities</b>	A stopping.
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i><b>Peace</b> came on November 11th.</i>

**suspension of hostilities**                      The act of suspending something (hanging it from above so it moves freely).

## Usage Examples of "Truce" as a noun

- *The guerrillas called a three-day truce.*

## Associations of "Truce" (30 Words)

<b>agreement</b>	The statement (oral or written) of an exchange of promises. <i>They had an <b>agreement</b> that they would not interfere in each other's business.</i>
<b>armistice</b>	An agreement made by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting for a certain time; a truce. <i>The Italian government signed an <b>armistice</b> with the Allies.</i>
<b>bargaining</b>	The negotiation of the terms of a transaction or agreement.
<b>brief</b>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>A <b>brief</b> stay in the country.</i>
<b>cessation</b>	A stopping. <i>A <b>cessation</b> of the thunder.</i>
<b>compromise</b>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>Yo yo dieting can <b>compromise</b> your immune system.</i>
<b>concise</b>	Giving a lot of information clearly and in a few words; brief but comprehensive. <i>A <b>concise</b> explanation.</i>
<b>discontinuance</b>	The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent).
<b>ephemeral</b>	An ephemeral plant. <i><b>Ephemerals</b> avoid the periods of drought as seeds.</i>
<b>episodic</b>	Of writing or narration; divided into or composed of episodes. <i><b>Episodic</b> television is a difficult medium to write for.</i>
<b>evanescent</b>	Denoting a field or wave which extends into a region where it cannot propagate and whose amplitude therefore decreases with distance. <i><b>Evanescent</b> beauty.</i>
<b>finalize</b>	Make final; put the last touches on; put into final form. <i>Efforts intensified to <b>finalize</b> plans for post war reconstruction.</i>
<b>fleeting</b>	Lasting for a very short time. <i>For a <b>fleeting</b> moment I saw the face of a boy.</i>

<b>fugitive</b>	A person who has escaped from captivity or is in hiding. <i>The <b>fugitive</b> effects of light.</i>
<b><u>makeshift</u></b>	Something contrived to meet an urgent need or emergency. <i>The rock served as a <b>makeshift</b> hammer.</i>
<b>momentary</b>	Lasting for a markedly brief time. <i>A <b>momentary</b> glimpse.</i>
<b>negotiate</b>	Try to reach an agreement or compromise by discussion. <i>They <b>negotiated</b> the sale of the house.</i>
<b>parley</b>	A negotiation between enemies. <i>A <b>parley</b> is in progress and the invaders may withdraw.</i>
<b>provisional</b>	A provisional stamp. <i><b>Provisional</b> bookings.</i>
<b>provisory</b>	Subject to a proviso; conditional. <i>A <b>provisory</b> clause.</i>
<b>sojourn</b>	A temporary stay (e.g., as a guest). <i>She had <b>sojourned</b> once in Egypt.</i>
<b>stopgap</b>	A temporary way of dealing with a problem or satisfying a need. <i>Transplants are only a <b>stopgap</b> until more sophisticated alternatives can work.</i>
<b>succinctness</b>	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
<b>temporary</b>	A person employed on a temporary basis typically an office worker who finds employment through an agency. <i>Employed on a <b>temporary</b> basis.</i>
<b><u>tentative</u></b>	Done without confidence; hesitant. <i>Drew a few <b>tentative</b> conclusions.</i>
<b><u>terse</u></b>	Sparing in the use of words; abrupt. <i>A <b>terse</b> statement.</i>
<b>transience</b>	The attribute of being brief or fleeting. <i>The <b>transience</b> of life and happiness.</i>
<b><u>transient</u></b>	(physics) a short-lived oscillation in a system caused by a sudden change of voltage or current or load. <i><b>Transient</b> laborers.</i>
<b>transitory</b>	Not permanent. <i>Love is <b>transitory</b> but it is eternal.</i>
<b>truncate</b>	Make shorter as if by cutting off. <i>A <b>truncated</b> pyramid.</i>
