Truce as a Noun

Definitions of "Truce" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “truce” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An agreement between enemies or opponents to stop fighting or arguing for a certain time.*
- *A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms.*

Synonyms of "Truce" as a noun (6 Words)

armistice	A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms. <i>The Italian government signed an armistice with the Allies.</i>
cease-fire	A state of peace agreed to between opponents so they can discuss peace terms.
ceasefire	A temporary suspension of fighting; a truce. <i>The latest ceasefire seems to be holding.</i>
cessation of hostilities	A stopping.
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>Peace came on November 11th.</i>

suspension of hostilities The act of suspending something (hanging it from above so it moves freely).

Usage Examples of "Truce" as a noun

- *The guerrillas called a three-day truce.*

Associations of "Truce" (30 Words)

agreement	The statement (oral or written) of an exchange of promises. <i>They had an agreement that they would not interfere in each other's business.</i>
<u>armistice</u>	An agreement made by opposing sides in a war to stop fighting for a certain time; a truce. <i>The Italian government signed an armistice with the Allies.</i>
bargaining	The negotiation of the terms of a transaction or agreement.
<u>brief</u>	Instruct a barrister by brief. <i>A brief stay in the country.</i>
<u>cessation</u>	A stopping. <i>A cessation of the thunder.</i>
<u>compromise</u>	Make a compromise arrive at a compromise. <i>Yo yo dieting can compromise your immune system.</i>
<u>concise</u>	Giving a lot of information clearly and in a few words; brief but comprehensive. <i>A concise explanation.</i>
discontinuance	The act of discontinuing or breaking off; an interruption (temporary or permanent).
ephemeral	An ephemeral plant. <i>Ephemerals avoid the periods of drought as seeds.</i>
episodic	Of writing or narration; divided into or composed of episodes. <i>Episodic television is a difficult medium to write for.</i>
evanescent	Denoting a field or wave which extends into a region where it cannot propagate and whose amplitude therefore decreases with distance. <i>Evanescent beauty.</i>
<u>finalize</u>	Make final; put the last touches on; put into final form. <i>Efforts intensified to finalize plans for post war reconstruction.</i>
<u>fleeting</u>	Lasting for a very short time. <i>For a fleeting moment I saw the face of a boy.</i>

fugitive	A person who has escaped from captivity or is in hiding. <i>The fugitive effects of light.</i>
<u>makeshift</u>	Something contrived to meet an urgent need or emergency. <i>The rock served as a makeshift hammer.</i>
momentary	Lasting for a markedly brief time. <i>A momentary glimpse.</i>
negotiate	Try to reach an agreement or compromise by discussion. <i>They negotiated the sale of the house.</i>
parley	A negotiation between enemies. <i>A parley is in progress and the invaders may withdraw.</i>
provisional	A provisional stamp. <i>Provisional bookings.</i>
provisory	Subject to a proviso; conditional. <i>A provisory clause.</i>
sojourn	A temporary stay (e.g., as a guest). <i>She had sojourned once in Egypt.</i>
stopgap	A temporary way of dealing with a problem or satisfying a need. <i>Transplants are only a stopgap until more sophisticated alternatives can work.</i>
succinctness	Terseness and economy in writing and speaking achieved by expressing a great deal in just a few words.
temporary	A person employed on a temporary basis typically an office worker who finds employment through an agency. <i>Employed on a temporary basis.</i>
<u>tentative</u>	Done without confidence; hesitant. <i>Drew a few tentative conclusions.</i>
<u>terse</u>	Sparing in the use of words; abrupt. <i>A terse statement.</i>
transience	The attribute of being brief or fleeting. <i>The transience of life and happiness.</i>
<u>transient</u>	(physics) a short-lived oscillation in a system caused by a sudden change of voltage or current or load. <i>Transient laborers.</i>
transitory	Not permanent. <i>Love is transitory but it is eternal.</i>
truncate	Make shorter as if by cutting off. <i>A truncated pyramid.</i>
