- *To the fullest degree; genuinely or properly.*
- *With sincerity; without pretense.*

<u>exactly</u>	Used to emphasize the accuracy of a figure or description. <i>He was doing precisely or exactly what she had told him to do.</i>
faithfully	In a manner that is true to the facts or the original. <i>He swore that he would serve the king faithfully.</i>
<u>frankly</u>	In an open, honest, and direct manner. <i>She talks very frankly about herself.</i>
genuinely	Genuinely with authority. <i>This is a genuinely funny film.</i>
heartily	In a hearty manner. <i>They were heartily sick of the whole subject.</i>
<u>honestly</u>	It is sincerely the case that used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude honestly adv in an honest manner. <i>Honestly darling I'm not upset.</i>
in truth	To or toward the inside of.
<u>indeed</u>	An expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc. (used as an interjection). <i>They said the car would break down and indeed it did.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>It was immediately and indubitably apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers.</i>
openly	In an open way. <i>A lecturer who had openly criticized the government.</i>
perfectly	In a perfect or faultless way. <i>You're perfectly right.</i>
positively	With certainty; so as to leave no room for doubt. <i>This is positively the last word on the matter.</i>

precisely	Used as a reply to confirm or agree with a previous statement. <i>She always expressed herself precisely.</i>
profoundly	To a profound extent; extremely. <i>A profoundly disturbing experience.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>They don't really listen to us.</i>
rightfully	In accordance with a legitimate right or claim to property, position, or status. <i>Baseball rightfully is the nation's pastime.</i>
simply	(used for emphasis) absolutely. <i>They lived very simply.</i>
sincerely	With sincerity; without pretense. <i>I sincerely hope that we shall have a change of government.</i>
surely	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for <i>surely</i> . <i>If there is no will then surely the house goes automatically to you.</i>
thoroughly	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for <i>thoroughly</i> . <i>She was soon thoroughly bored.</i>
totally	Used to express agreement. <i>So then Julie like totally dumps her boyfriend Tommy.</i>
truthfully	Used to emphasize the truthfulness or honesty of a statement. <i>It is a hard question for me to answer truthfully.</i>
undeniably	To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner. <i>The results were undeniably impressive.</i>
undoubtedly	Without doubt; certainly. <i>It's undoubtedly very beautiful.</i>
unfeignedly	With sincerity; without pretense. <i>Was unfeignedly glad to see his old teacher.</i>
unquestionably	Without question. <i>Fred Winter is unquestionably the jockey to follow.</i>
utterly	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i>Utterly miserable.</i>

conciliatory	Intended or likely to placate or pacify. <i>A conciliatory approach.</i>
<u>correctly</u>	In a way that is socially acceptable; properly. <i>She correctly answered eight questions.</i>
definitely	In a definite manner; clearly. <i>I shall definitely be at the airport to meet you.</i>
<u>doubtless</u>	Certainly; without doubt. <i>The company would doubtless find the reduced competition to their liking.</i>
genuinely	Genuinely with authority. <i>They speak genuinely about how proud they are.</i>
<u>indeed</u>	Expressing interest of an ironic kind with repetition of a question just asked. <i>Who d believe it Who indeed.</i>
indubitably	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>It was immediately and indubitably apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers.</i>
justly	In a way that is well founded; justifiably. <i>We can justly be proud of our achievements.</i>
obvious	Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind. <i>It was an obvious remark to make.</i>
obviously	Unmistakably (‘plain’ is often used informally for ‘plainly’). <i>She was obviously unwell.</i>
propitiate	Make peace with. <i>The pagans thought it was important to propitiate the gods with sacrifices.</i>
propitiatory	Having power to atone for or offered by way of expiation or propitiation. <i>Sent flowers as a propitiatory gesture.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They don t really listen to us.</i>

sincerely	In a sincere or genuine way. <i>I sincerely hope that we shall have a change of government.</i>
so	Used to introduce a logical conclusion from that fact or reason or as a result. <i>Your old man was the salt of the earth so he was.</i>
sure	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>A sure or trusted friend.</i>
surely	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and surely in that direction.</i>
undoubtedly	Without doubt; certainly. <i>They are undoubtedly guilty.</i>
unquestionably	Without question. <i>The awards were unquestionably deserved.</i>
verily	Truly; certainly. <i>Verily these men are mad.</i>
very	Actual; precise (used to emphasize the exact identity of someone or something). <i>She was very gifted.</i>
