- *In accordance with truth or fact or reality.*
- *To the fullest degree; genuinely or properly.*
- *With sincerity; without pretense.*

<b><u>correctly</u></b>	In a way that is socially acceptable; properly. <i>She <b>correctly</b> answered eight questions.</i>
<b>definitely</b>	In a definite manner; clearly. <i>I shall <b>definitely</b> be at the airport to meet you.</i>
<b><u>exactly</u></b>	Used to emphasize the accuracy of a figure or description. <i>He was doing precisely or <b>exactly</b> what she had told him to do.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a manner that is true to the facts or the original. <i>He swore that he would serve the king <b>faithfully</b>.</i>
<b><u>frankly</u></b>	In an open, honest, and direct manner. <i>She talks very <b>frankly</b> about herself.</i>
<b>genuinely</b>	Genuinely with authority. <i>This is a <b>genuinely</b> funny film.</i>
<b>heartily</b>	In a hearty manner. <i>They were <b>heartily</b> sick of the whole subject.</i>
<b><u>honestly</u></b>	It is sincerely the case that used as intensives reflecting the speaker's attitude honestly adv in an honest manner. <i><b>Honestly</b> darling I'm not upset.</i>
<b>in truth</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b><u>indeed</u></b>	An expression of surprise or skepticism or irony etc. (used as an interjection). <i>They said the car would break down and <b>indeed</b> it did.</i>
<b>indubitably</b>	In a manner or to a degree that could not be doubted. <i>It was immediately and <b>indubitably</b> apparent that I had interrupted a scene of lovers.</i>
<b>openly</b>	In an open way. <i>A lecturer who had <b>openly</b> criticized the government.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	In a perfect or faultless way. <i>You're <b>perfectly</b> right.</i>
<b>positively</b>	With certainty; so as to leave no room for doubt. <i>This is <b>positively</b> the last word on the matter.</i>

<b>precisely</b>	Used as a reply to confirm or agree with a previous statement. <i>She always expressed herself <b>precisely</b>.</i>
<b>profoundly</b>	To a profound extent; extremely. <i>A <b>profoundly</b> disturbing experience.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> <i>rattling</i> is informal. <i>They don't <b>really</b> listen to us.</i>
<b>rightfully</b>	In accordance with a legitimate right or claim to property, position, or status. <i>Baseball <b>rightfully</b> is the nation's pastime.</i>
<b>simply</b>	(used for emphasis) absolutely. <i>They lived very <b>simply</b>.</i>
<b>sincerely</b>	With sincerity; without pretense. <i>I <b>sincerely</b> hope that we shall have a change of government.</i>

<b>thoroughly</b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for <i>thoroughly</i> . <i>She was soon <b>thoroughly</b> bored.</i>
<b>totally</b>	Used to express agreement. <i>So then Julie like <b>totally</b> dumps her boyfriend Tommy.</i>
<b>truthfully</b>	Used to emphasize the truthfulness or honesty of a statement. <i>It is a hard question for me to answer <b>truthfully</b>.</i>
<b>undeniably</b>	To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner. <i>The results were <b>undeniably</b> impressive.</i>
<b>undoubtedly</b>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>It's <b>undoubtedly</b> very beautiful.</i>
<b>unfeignedly</b>	With sincerity; without pretense. <i>Was <b>unfeignedly</b> glad to see his old teacher.</i>
<b>unquestionably</b>	Without question. <i>Fred Winter is <b>unquestionably</b> the jockey to follow.</i>
<b>utterly</b>	Completely and without qualification; absolutely. <i><b>Utterly</b> miserable.</i>

<b>propitiatory</b>	Having power to atone for or offered by way of expiation or propitiation. <i>Sent flowers as a <b>propitiatory</b> gesture.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>They don t <b>really</b> listen to us.</i>

<b>sincerely</b>	In a sincere or genuine way. <i>I <b>sincerely</b> hope that we shall have a change of government.</i>
<b>so</b>	Used to introduce a logical conclusion from that fact or reason or as a result. <i>Your old man was the salt of the earth <b>so</b> he was.</i>
<b>sure</b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>A <b>sure</b> or trusted friend.</i>
<b>surely</b>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i>No one knows how to move the economy quickly and <b>surely</b> in that direction.</i>
<b>undoubtedly</b>	Without doubt; certainly. <i>They are <b>undoubtedly</b> guilty.</i>
<b>unquestionably</b>	Without question. <i>The awards were <b>unquestionably</b> deserved.</i>
