### **Definitions of "Trusted" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “trusted” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Regarded as reliable or truthful.*
- *Worthy of trust or confidence.*
- *(of persons) worthy of trust or confidence.*



## Synonyms of "Trusted" as an adjective (1 Word)

**sure** Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured.  
Was **sure** or *certain* she had seen it.



## Usage Examples of "Trusted" as an adjective

- A *trusted* adviser.
- A *sure* (or *trusted*) friend.



## Associations of "Trusted" (30 Words)

- assured**      Marked by assurance; exhibiting confidence.  
*She paints with an **assured** hand.*
- belief**      A vague idea in which some confidence is placed.  
*The medieval system of fervent religious **belief**.*
- believable**      (of a fictional character or situation) convincing or realistic.  
*A drama that lacks **believable** characters.*
- believe**      Follow a credo have a faith be a believer.  
*When you hear his sermons you will be able to **believe** too.*
- believing**      The cognitive process that leads to convictions.  
*Seeing is **believing**.*

<b><u>confidant</u></b>	A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close <b>confidante</b> of the princess.</i>
<b>confidence</b>	The telling of private matters or secrets with mutual trust. <i><b>Confidence</b> is always borrowed never owned.</i>
<b>confiding</b>	Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>She was in a <b>confiding</b> mood.</i>
<b>credibility</b>	The quality of being trusted and believed in. <i>The book s anecdotes have scant regard for <b>credibility</b>.</i>
<b><u>credible</u></b>	Capable of being believed. <i>Few people found his story <b>credible</b>.</i>
<b>credit</b>	The quality of being believed or credited. <i>The abstract philosophy of Cicero has lost its <b>credit</b>.</i>
<b><u>credo</u></b>	Any system of principles or beliefs. <i>He announced his <b>credo</b> in his first editorial.</i>
<b><u>credulity</u></b>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.</i>
<b>credulous</b>	Disposed to believe on little evidence. <i>So <b>credulous</b> he believes everything he reads.</i>
<b><u>dedication</u></b>	The quality of being dedicated or committed to a task or purpose. <i>The <b>dedication</b> of a new city church.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Worthy of reliance or trust. <i>The most valuable and <b>dependable</b> of America s allies.</i>
<b><u>faith</u></b>	Loyalty or allegiance to a cause or a person. <i>They broke <b>faith</b> with their investors.</i>
<b><u>faithful</u></b>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>Employees who had notched up decades of <b>faithful</b> service.</i>
<b><u>gullible</u></b>	Easily persuaded to believe something; credulous. <i>An attempt to persuade a <b>gullible</b> public to spend their money.</i>
<b><u>loyal</u></b>	Giving or showing firm and constant support or allegiance to a person or institution. <i><b>Loyal</b> service.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	Apparently reasonable and valid, and truthful. <i>It seems <b>plausible</b> that one of two things may happen.</i>
<b>redound</b>	Return or recoil. <i>His latest diplomatic effort will <b>redound</b> to his credit.</i>

<b>reliability</b>	The degree to which the result of a measurement, calculation, or specification can be depended on to be accurate. <i>These data throw doubt on the <b>reliability</b> of national statistics.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i>The supporting cast includes old <b>reliables</b> like Mitchell.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>I should never have <b>trusted</b> her.</i>
<b>trustful</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>A <b>trustful</b> acceptance of authority.</i>
<b>trusting</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>A shy and <b>trusting</b> child.</i>
<b>trustworthy</b>	Worthy of trust or belief. <i><b>Trustworthy</b> public servants.</i>
<b>verisimilitude</b>	The appearance of truth; the quality of seeming to be true. <i>The detail gives the novel some <b>verisimilitude</b>.</i>
