full of integrity Having ample fabric.

honest Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent.
He s struggling to make an **honest** living.

honourable Adhering to ethical and moral principles.
This is the only **honourable** course.

incorruptible Not subject to death or decay; everlasting.
Incorruptible judges are the backbone of the society.

principled	(of a system or method) based on a given set of rules. <i>A coherent and principled approach.</i>
reliable	Worthy of being depended on. <i>A reliable source of information.</i>
true	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>He was true to his word.</i>
trusty	Having served for a long time and regarded as reliable or faithful. <i>My trusty old Morris Minor.</i>
truthful	(of artistic or literary representation) characterized by accuracy or realism; true to life. <i>Gave truthful testimony.</i>
unimpeachable	Beyond doubt or reproach. <i>An unimpeachable witness.</i>
upright	Upright in position or posture. <i>An upright and respectable man.</i>
<u>virtuous</u>	Having or showing high moral standards. <i>She considered herself very virtuous because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
worthy of trust	Having worth or merit or value; being honorable or admirable.

accuracy	The number of significant figures given in a number. <i>We have confidence in the accuracy of the statistics.</i>
belief	Something one accepts as true or real; a firmly held opinion. <i>A belief in democratic politics.</i>
believable	Able to be believed; credible. <i>She felt that Dawn's story was not quite believable.</i>
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>The deal is believed to be worth around 15 million.</i>
believing	The cognitive process that leads to convictions. <i>Seeing is believing.</i>
confiding	Willing to entrust personal matters. <i>First she was suspicious then she became confiding.</i>

credibility	The quality of being trusted and believed in. <i>The book's anecdotes have scant regard for credibility.</i>
credible	Credulous. <i>She was not the credible fool he expected.</i>
credulity	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their credulity and inexperience.</i>
credulous	Having or showing too great a readiness to believe things. <i>The gimmick would convince none but the most credulous.</i>
dependable	Financially sound. <i>A dependable worker.</i>
faith	A particular religion. <i>He lost his faith but not his morality.</i>
faithful	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>A faithful copy of the portrait.</i>
faithfully	In a loyal manner. <i>It always came on faithfully like the radio.</i>
gullible	Easily persuaded to believe something; credulous. <i>Gullible tourists taken in by the shell game.</i>
honorable	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>An honorable man.</i>
integrity	The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles. <i>Upholding territorial integrity and national sovereignty.</i>
loyal	Inspired by love for your country. <i>Loyal friends stood by him.</i>
plausible	Given to or characterized by presenting specious arguments. <i>A plausible excuse.</i>
reliability	The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The car's background gives me every confidence in its reliability.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>Reliable information.</i>
sincerity	The trait of being serious. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>
stanch	Stop the flow of a liquid.
trust	Confer a trust upon. <i>A trust was set up.</i>
trusted	Regarded as reliable or truthful. <i>A trusted adviser.</i>

trustful	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>A trustful acceptance of authority.</i>
trusting	Showing or tending to have a belief in a person's honesty or sincerity; not suspicious. <i>A shy and trusting child.</i>
truthful	Conforming to truth. <i>A truthful person.</i>
<u>truthfulness</u>	The quality of being truthful. <i>We have had to judge the truthfulness of the evidence.</i>
verisimilitude	The appearance of being true or real. <i>The detail gives the novel some verisimilitude.</i>
