**ethical** Adhering to ethical and moral principles.

**full of integrity** Having ample fabric.

**honest** Not disposed to cheat or defraud; not deceptive or fraudulent.  
He s struggling to make an **honest** living.

**honourable** Adhering to ethical and moral principles.  
This is the only **honourable** course.

**incorruptible** Not subject to death or decay; everlasting.  
**Incorruptible** judges are the backbone of the society.

<b>principled</b>	(of a system or method) based on a given set of rules. <i>A coherent and <b>principled</b> approach.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	Worthy of being depended on. <i>A <b>reliable</b> source of information.</i>
<b>true</b>	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>He was <b>true</b> to his word.</i>
<b>trusty</b>	Having served for a long time and regarded as reliable or faithful. <i>My <b>trusty</b> old Morris Minor.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	(of artistic or literary representation) characterized by accuracy or realism; true to life. <i>Gave <b>truthful</b> testimony.</i>
<b>unimpeachable</b>	Beyond doubt or reproach. <i>An <b>unimpeachable</b> witness.</i>
<b>upright</b>	Upright in position or posture. <i>An <b>upright</b> and respectable man.</i>
<u><b>virtuous</b></u>	Having or showing high moral standards. <i>She considered herself very <b>virtuous</b> because she neither drank nor smoked.</i>
<b>worthy of trust</b>	Having worth or merit or value; being honorable or admirable.

<u><b>credulity</b></u>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.</i>
<b>credulous</b>	Having or showing too great a readiness to believe things. <i>The gimmick would convince none but the most <b>credulous</b>.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Financially sound. <i>A <b>dependable</b> worker.</i>
<u><b>faith</b></u>	A particular religion. <i>He lost his <b>faith</b> but not his morality.</i>
<u><b>faithful</b></u>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>A <b>faithful</b> copy of the portrait.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a loyal manner. <i>It always came on <b>faithfully</b> like the radio.</i>
<u><b>gullible</b></u>	Easily persuaded to believe something; credulous. <i><b>Gullible</b> tourists taken in by the shell game.</i>
<u><b>honorable</b></u>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>An <b>honorable</b> man.</i>
<b>integrity</b>	The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles. <i>Upholding territorial <b>integrity</b> and national sovereignty.</i>
<u><b>loyal</b></u>	Inspired by love for your country. <i><b>Loyal</b> friends stood by him.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	Given to or characterized by presenting specious arguments. <i>A <b>plausible</b> excuse.</i>
<b>reliability</b>	The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The car's background gives me every confidence in its <b>reliability</b>.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i><b>Reliable</b> information.</i>
<u><b>sincerity</b></u>	The trait of being serious. <i>The simple <b>sincerity</b> of folk songs.</i>
<b>stanch</b>	Stop the flow of a liquid.
<b>trust</b>	Confer a trust upon. <i>A <b>trust</b> was set up.</i>
<u><b>trusted</b></u>	Regarded as reliable or truthful. <i>A <b>trusted</b> adviser.</i>



<b>trustful</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust. <i>A <b>trustful</b> acceptance of authority.</i>
<b>trusting</b>	Showing or tending to have a belief in a person's honesty or sincerity; not suspicious. <i>A shy and <b>trusting</b> child.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	Conforming to truth. <i>A <b>truthful</b> person.</i>
<u><b>truthfulness</b></u>	The quality of being truthful. <i>We have had to judge the <b>truthfulness</b> of the evidence.</i>
