| innocence | A state or condition of being innocent of a specific crime or offense. The trial established his innocence. |
| integrity | The condition of being unified or sound in construction. The integrity of the nervous system is required for normal development. |
| openness | Lack of secrecy or concealment; frankness. It is the openness to possibilities that creates great research. |
| outspoken | Frank in stating one's opinions, especially if they are shocking or controversial. <br> It is possible to be outspoken without being rude. |
| righteousness | Adhering to moral principles. We had little doubt about the righteousness of our cause. |

| sheer | Cause to sheer. <br> She sheered her car around the obstacle. |
| sincere | (of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <br> They offer their sincere thanks to Paul. |

| straight | A straight segment of a roadway or racecourse. I m so tired I can hardly think straight. |
