candidness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
candour	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech. <i>A man of refreshing candour.</i>
forthrightness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
frankness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech. <i>Lisa spoke with disarming frankness about the accident.</i>
genuineness	Sincerity. <i>The uneven appearance of the grain confirms the genuineness of the leather.</i>
honesty	The quality of being honest. <i>It was not in all honesty an auspicious debut.</i>
lack of deceit	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
openness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>Fitness levels have evolved to increase the speed and openness of the game.</i>

sincerity

The absence of pretence, deceit, or hypocrisy.
*They demanded some proof of my **sincerity**.*

trustworthiness

The ability to be relied on as honest or truthful.
*He has to prove his **trustworthiness** to you.*

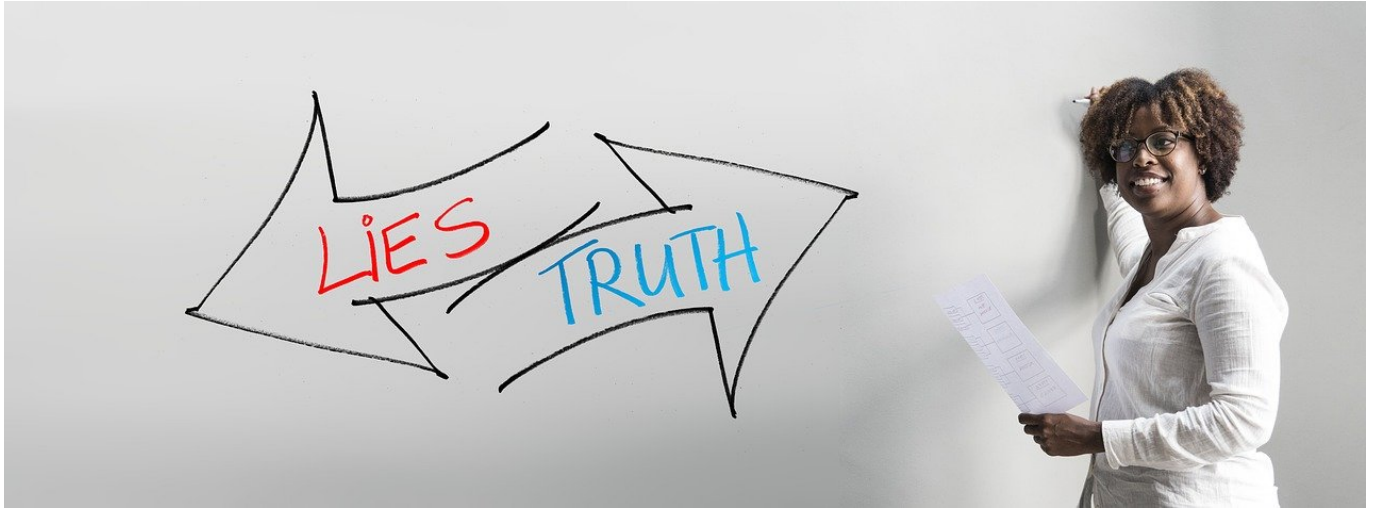
veracity

Unwillingness to tell lies.
*Officials expressed doubts concerning the **veracity** of the story.*



Usage Examples of "Truthfulness" as a noun

- *We have had to judge the truthfulness of the evidence.*
- *The truthfulness of her playing of an ageing American spinster.*



Associations of "Truthfulness" (30 Words)

accuracy	The degree to which the result of a measurement, calculation, or specification conforms to the correct value or a standard. <i>We have confidence in the accuracy of the statistics.</i>
authenticity	Undisputed credibility. <i>The paper should have established the authenticity of the documents before publishing them.</i>
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>The superintendent believed Lancaster's story.</i>
benevolence	An inclination to do kind or charitable acts.
candid	Informal or natural; especially caught off guard or unprepared. <i>A candid interview.</i>
candor	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
candour	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech. <i>A man of refreshing candour.</i>
credibility	The quality of being convincing or believable. <i>The book's anecdotes have scant regard for credibility.</i>
decency	The requirements of accepted or respectable behaviour. <i>She had the decency to come and confess.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
forthrightness	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.

frank	Exempt by means of an official pass or letter, as from customs or other checks. <i>Kate looked at Sam with frank admiration.</i>
<u>genuine</u>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>Genuine emotion.</i>
<u>honest</u>	(of an action) done with good intentions even if unsuccessful or misguided. <i>Good honest food with no gimmicks.</i>
<u>honesty</u>	The quality of being honest. <i>There s a well stocked honesty bar which includes local wine.</i>
integrity	The quality of being honest and having strong moral principles. <i>A gentleman of complete integrity.</i>
<u>openness</u>	Acceptance of or receptiveness to change or new ideas. <i>A democratic society committed to openness and transparency.</i>
probity	Complete and confirmed integrity; having strong moral principles. <i>In a world where financial probity may not be widespread.</i>
rectitude	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>Mattie is a model of rectitude.</i>
reliability	The degree to which the result of a measurement, calculation, or specification can be depended on to be accurate. <i>The car s background gives me every confidence in its reliability.</i>
righteousness	The quality of being morally right or justifiable. <i>Conviction of his own moral righteousness gave his oratory an irresistible power.</i>
<u>sincere</u>	Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings. <i>A painfully sincere young actor.</i>
<u>sincerity</u>	The trait of being serious. <i>His sincerity inspired belief.</i>
soundness	The state of being in good condition; robustness. <i>Mental and physical soundness.</i>
transparency	A positive transparent photograph printed on transparent plastic or glass, able to be viewed using a slide projector. <i>The transparency of ice.</i>
trustworthiness	The trait of deserving trust and confidence. <i>He has to prove his trustworthiness to you.</i>
truth	The quality or state of being true. <i>Tell me the truth.</i>

- truthful** Expressing or given to expressing the truth.
*Gave **truthful** testimony.*
- uprightness** Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest.
*Steadying himself he slowly managed to achieve a state of relative **uprightness**.*
- veracity** Unwillingness to tell lies.
*Voters should be concerned about his **veracity** and character.*
