## Associations of "Tsunami" (30 Words)

<a href="#">adversity</a>	A stroke of ill fortune; a calamitous event. <i>Debt ridden farmers struggling with <b>adversity</b>.</i>
<a href="#">aftermath</a>	New grass growing after mowing or harvest. <i>The <b>aftermath</b> of war.</i>
<b>aftershock</b>	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
<b>aid</b>	Promote or encourage (something). <i>700 000 tons of food <b>aid</b>.</i>
<b>befall</b>	Happen, occur, or be the case in the course of events or by chance (Santayana). <i>He promised that no harm would <b>befall</b> her.</i>
<b>betide</b>	Become of; happen to. <i>I waited with beating heart not knowing what would <b>betide</b>.</i>
<a href="#">calamity</a>	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>The journey had led to <b>calamity</b> and ruin.</i>
<b>cataclysm</b>	A sudden violent change in the earth's surface. <i>The <b>cataclysm</b> of the First World War.</i>
<b>catastrophe</b>	Something very unfortunate or unsuccessful. <i>The tax would be a <b>catastrophe</b> for the industry.</i>
<b>cloudburst</b>	A heavy rain.
<a href="#">destruction</a>	A group of wild cats. <i>The <b>destruction</b> of the rainforest.</i>
<a href="#">devastating</a>	Physically or spiritually devastating often used in combination. <i>A <b>devastating</b> portrait of human folly.</i>
<b>devastation</b>	The feeling of being confounded or overwhelmed. <i>Her departure left him in utter <b>devastation</b>.</i>

<b>disaster</b>	A sudden accident or a natural catastrophe that causes great damage or loss of life. <i>A string of personal <b>disasters</b>.</i>
<b>disruption</b>	A disorderly outburst or tumult. <i>There had been no delays or <b>disruptions</b> to flights.</i>
<u>earthquake</u>	A sudden violent shaking of the ground, typically causing great destruction, as a result of movements within the earth's crust or volcanic action. <i>A political <b>earthquake</b>.</i>
<u>epicenter</u>	The point on the Earth's surface directly above the focus of an earthquake.
<b>flood</b>	Become covered or submerged by a flood. <i><b>Floods</b> of tourists come each year to marvel at the sights.</i>
<b>floodplain</b>	An area of low-lying ground adjacent to a river, formed mainly of river sediments and subject to flooding.
<b>flowage</b>	Gradual internal motion or deformation of a solid body (as by heat). <i>Many campsites were located near the <b>flowage</b>.</i>
<b>freshet</b>	The flood of a river from heavy rain or melted snow.
<u>impending</u>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>A fortune teller with dire warnings about <b>impending</b> doom.</i>
<b>inundate</b>	Flood. <i>The basement was <b>inundated</b> after the storm.</i>
<b>inundation</b>	Flooding. <i>Areas were at risk of <b>inundation</b>.</i>
<u>misfortune</u>	Bad luck. <i>Never laugh at other people's <b>misfortunes</b>.</i>
<b>overflow</b>	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>There was some <b>overflow</b> after heavy rainfall.</i>
<b>seismic</b>	Subject to or caused by an earthquake or earth vibration. <i>After a few days of <b>seismic</b> activity the volcanic eruption started.</i>
<b>seismograph</b>	A measuring instrument for detecting and measuring the intensity and direction and duration of movements of the ground (as an earthquake).
<u>torrent</u>	A heavy rain. <i>The houses were swept away in the <b>torrent</b>.</i>
<u>tragedy</u>	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>His life had been plagued by <b>tragedy</b>.</i>
