Associations of "Tsunami" (30 Words)

adversity	A stroke of ill fortune; a calamitous event. <i>Debt ridden farmers struggling with adversity.</i>
aftermath	New grass growing after mowing or harvest. <i>The aftermath of war.</i>
aftershock	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
aid	Promote or encourage (something). <i>700 000 tons of food aid.</i>
befall	Happen, occur, or be the case in the course of events or by chance (Santayana). <i>He promised that no harm would befall her.</i>
betide	Become of; happen to. <i>I waited with beating heart not knowing what would betide.</i>
calamity	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>The journey had led to calamity and ruin.</i>
cataclysm	A sudden violent change in the earth’s surface. <i>The cataclysm of the First World War.</i>
catastrophe	Something very unfortunate or unsuccessful. <i>The tax would be a catastrophe for the industry.</i>
cloudburst	A heavy rain.
destruction	A group of wild cats. <i>The destruction of the rainforest.</i>
devastating	Physically or spiritually devastating often used in combination. <i>A devastating portrait of human folly.</i>
devastation	The feeling of being confounded or overwhelmed. <i>Her departure left him in utter devastation.</i>

disaster	A sudden accident or a natural catastrophe that causes great damage or loss of life. <i>A string of personal disasters.</i>
disruption	A disorderly outburst or tumult. <i>There had been no delays or disruptions to flights.</i>
<u>earthquake</u>	A sudden violent shaking of the ground, typically causing great destruction, as a result of movements within the earth's crust or volcanic action. <i>A political earthquake.</i>
<u>epicenter</u>	The point on the Earth's surface directly above the focus of an earthquake.
flood	Become covered or submerged by a flood. <i>Floods of tourists come each year to marvel at the sights.</i>
floodplain	An area of low-lying ground adjacent to a river, formed mainly of river sediments and subject to flooding.
flowage	Gradual internal motion or deformation of a solid body (as by heat). <i>Many campsites were located near the flowage.</i>
freshet	The flood of a river from heavy rain or melted snow.
<u>impending</u>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>A fortune teller with dire warnings about impending doom.</i>
inundate	Flood. <i>The basement was inundated after the storm.</i>
inundation	Flooding. <i>Areas were at risk of inundation.</i>
<u>misfortune</u>	Bad luck. <i>Never laugh at other people's misfortunes.</i>
overflow	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>There was some overflow after heavy rainfall.</i>
seismic	Subject to or caused by an earthquake or earth vibration. <i>After a few days of seismic activity the volcanic eruption started.</i>
seismograph	A measuring instrument for detecting and measuring the intensity and direction and duration of movements of the ground (as an earthquake).
<u>torrent</u>	A heavy rain. <i>The houses were swept away in the torrent.</i>
<u>tragedy</u>	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>His life had been plagued by tragedy.</i>
