- *A fee paid for instruction (especially for higher education).*

tutelage	Attention and management implying responsibility for safety. <i>The organizations remained under firm government tutelage.</i>
tutorials	A session of intensive tuition given by a tutor to an individual or to a small number of students.
<u>tutoring</u>	A person who gives private instruction (as in singing, acting, etc).
tutorship	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).

homeroom	A classroom in which all students in a particular grade (or in a division of a grade) meet at certain times under the supervision of a teacher who takes attendance and does other administrative business.
matriculate	A person who has matriculated. <i>They had recently matriculated as undergraduates at Jesus College.</i>
pedagogics	The principles and methods of instruction.
pedagogy	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i>Pedagogy is recognized as an important profession.</i>
polytechnic	A technical school offering instruction in many industrial arts and applied sciences.
pupil	The contractile aperture in the center of the iris of the eye; resembles a large black dot. <i>Will you take me on as your pupil.</i>
<u>school</u>	A day s work at school. <i>Stay after school.</i>
<u>schooling</u>	The process of being formally educated at a school. <i>His parents paid for his schooling.</i>
schoolmaster	Presiding officer of a school.
semester	One of two divisions of an academic year. <i>The opening week of Harvard s autumn semester.</i>
student	A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. <i>High school students.</i>
studying	Reading carefully with intent to remember.
teach	A teacher. <i>She came to say Hi to her old teach.</i>

<u>teacher</u>	A person who teaches, especially in a school. <i>Books were his teachers.</i>
teaching	Ideas or principles taught by an authority. <i>The teachings of the Koran.</i>
<u>trainee</u>	Someone who is being trained. <i>Trainee solicitors.</i>
tutelage	Instruction; tuition. <i>He felt privileged to be under the tutelage of an experienced actor.</i>
tutorship	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
undergraduate	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford undergraduates.</i>
<u>university</u>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to university at the Sorbonne.</i>
