## Tuition as a Noun

### Definitions of "Tuition" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tuition” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A sum of money charged for teaching by a college or university.*
- *Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).*
- *Teaching or instruction, especially of individual pupils or small groups.*
- *A fee paid for instruction (especially for higher education).*

<b>andragogy</b>	<i>Much has been written about <b>andragogy</b> in general education circles over the past fifty years.</i>
<b>coaching</b>	A railcar where passengers ride.
<b>education</b>	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>Colleges of <b>education</b>.</i>

<b>instruction</b>	A direction or order. <i>Our <b>instruction</b> was carefully programmed.</i>
<b>lessons</b>	Punishment intended as a warning to others. <i>He took driving <b>lessons</b>.</i>
<b>pedagogy</b>	The principles and methods of instruction. <i><b>Pedagogy</b> is recognized as an important profession.</i>
<b><u>schooling</u></b>	The training of an animal (especially the training of a horse for dressage). <i>His parents paid for his <b>schooling</b>.</i>
<b>teaching</b>	The profession of a teacher. <i>The <b>teachings</b> of the Koran.</i>
<b>tuition fee</b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
<b>tutelage</b>	Attention and management implying responsibility for safety. <i>The organizations remained under firm government <b>tutelage</b>.</i>
<b>tutorials</b>	A session of intensive tuition given by a tutor to an individual or to a small number of students.
<b><u>tutoring</u></b>	A person who gives private instruction (as in singing, acting, etc).
<b>tutorship</b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).

## Usage Examples of "Tuition" as a noun

- *Private tuition in French.*
- *Tuition and room and board were more than \$25,000.*
- *Tuition fees.*

## Associations of "Tuition" (30 Words)

<b>academic</b>	A teacher or scholar in a university or other institute of higher education. <i>Students resplendent in <b>academic</b> dress.</i>
<b><u>campus</u></b>	A field on which the buildings of a university are situated. <i>For the first year I had a room on <b>campus</b>.</i>
<b>college</b>	The body of faculty and students of a college. <i><b>Colleges</b> of further education.</i>
<b>diploma</b>	A certificate awarded by an educational establishment to show that someone has successfully completed a course of study.
<b><u>disciple</u></b>	A follower or pupil of a teacher, leader, or philosopher. <i>A <b>disciple</b> of Rousseau.</i>

<b><u>educate</u></b>	Teach or refine to be discriminative in taste or judgment. <i>A plan to <b>educate</b> the young on the dangers of drugs.</i>
<b>education</b>	The United States federal department that administers all federal programs dealing with education including federal aid to educational institutions and students created 1979. <i>Health <b>education</b>.</i>
<b><u>educator</u></b>	A person who provides instruction or education; a teacher. <i>The perspective of a professional <b>educator</b>.</i>
<b>grad</b>	One-hundredth of a right angle.
<b>headmaster</b>	A man who is the head teacher in a school.
<b>homeroom</b>	A classroom in which all students in a particular grade (or in a division of a grade) meet at certain times under the supervision of a teacher who takes attendance and does other administrative business.
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>They had recently <b>matriculated</b> as undergraduates at Jesus College.</i>
<b>pedagogics</b>	The principles and methods of instruction.
<b>pedagogy</b>	The activities of educating or instructing; activities that impart knowledge or skill. <i><b>Pedagogy</b> is recognized as an important profession.</i>
<b>polytechnic</b>	A technical school offering instruction in many industrial arts and applied sciences.
<b>pupil</b>	The contractile aperture in the center of the iris of the eye; resembles a large black dot. <i>Will you take me on as your <b>pupil</b>.</i>
<b><u>school</u></b>	A day s work at school. <i>Stay after <b>school</b>.</i>
<b><u>schooling</u></b>	The process of being formally educated at a school. <i>His parents paid for his <b>schooling</b>.</i>
<b>schoolmaster</b>	Presiding officer of a school.
<b>semester</b>	One of two divisions of an academic year. <i>The opening week of Harvard s autumn <b>semester</b>.</i>
<b>student</b>	A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. <i>High school <b>students</b>.</i>
<b>studying</b>	Reading carefully with intent to remember.
<b>teach</b>	A teacher. <i>She came to say Hi to her old <b>teach</b>.</i>

<b><u>teacher</u></b>	A person who teaches, especially in a school. <i>Books were his <b>teachers</b>.</i>
<b>teaching</b>	Ideas or principles taught by an authority. <i>The <b>teachings</b> of the Koran.</i>
<b><u>trainee</u></b>	Someone who is being trained. <i><b>Trainee</b> solicitors.</i>
<b>tutelage</b>	Instruction; tuition. <i>He felt privileged to be under the <b>tutelage</b> of an experienced actor.</i>
<b>tutorship</b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
<b>undergraduate</b>	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford <b>undergraduates</b>.</i>
<b><u>university</u></b>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to <b>university</b> at the Sorbonne.</i>
