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## Associations of "Tuning" (30 Words)

<b>acoustic</b>	Of or relating to the science of acoustics. <i>Tyndall lectured on <b>acoustics</b>.</i>
<b>arpeggio</b>	The notes of a chord played in rapid succession, either ascending or descending.
<b>atonal</b>	Characterized by avoidance of traditional western tonality. <i><b>Atonal</b> music may be written by obscuring tonal structures or by ignoring conventional harmonies altogether.</i>
<b>babble</b>	Flow in an irregular current with a bubbling noise. <i>I gasped and stared and <b>babbled</b> Look at this.</i>
<b>ballad</b>	A poem or song narrating a story in short stanzas Traditional ballads are typically of unknown authorship having been passed on orally from one generation to the next.
<b>chord</b>	Play chords on a stringed instrument. <i>The triumphal opening <b>chords</b>.</i>
<b>chorus</b>	A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama. <i>Good morning we replied in <b>chorus</b>.</i>
<b>chromatic</b>	Of an instrument able to play all the notes of the chromatic scale. <i>A <b>chromatic</b> scale.</i>
<b>clef</b>	A musical notation written on a staff indicating the pitch of the notes following it.
<b>diatonic</b>	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
<b>ditty</b>	A short, simple song. <i>A lovely little music hall <b>ditty</b>.</i>
<b>duet</b>	Perform a duet. <i>A simple <b>duet</b> for two cellos.</i>
<b>euphony</b>	The tendency to make phonetic change for ease of pronunciation. <i>The poet put <b>euphony</b> before mere factuality.</i>

<b>guitar</b>	A stringed musical instrument, with a fretted fingerboard, typically incurved sides, and six or twelve strings, played by plucking or strumming with the fingers or a plectrum.
<b>harmony</b>	Agreement of opinions. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>lullaby</b>	Sing to (someone) to get them to go to sleep. <i>She lullabied us, she fed us.</i>
<b>melody</b>	The principal part in harmonized music. <i>We have the <b>melody</b> and bass of a song composed by Strozzi.</i>
<b>music</b>	Music the sounds produced by singers or musical instruments or reproductions of such sounds. <i>Tony learned to read <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>octave</b>	The interval between the two notes at the extremes of an octave.
<b>pop</b>	Like a pop or with a pop. <i>The child <b>popped</b> the balloon.</i>
<b>rhythm</b>	A particular pattern formed by musical rhythm. <i>The twice daily <b>rhythms</b> of the tides.</i>
<b>sing</b>	A meeting for amateur singing. <i>A sponsored <b>sing</b> to pay for the theatre.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>The <b>singing</b> of hymns in Latin.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A female or boy singer with a soprano voice. <i><b>Soprano</b> voice.</i>
<b>tenor</b>	A singer with a tenor voice. <i>He had a good <b>tenor</b> voice.</i>
<b>timbre</b>	(music) the distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound). <i>The <b>timbre</b> of her soprano was rich and lovely.</i>
<b>tonality</b>	The harmonic effect of being in a particular key. <i>The sonata is noteworthy for its extensive variations of mood and <b>tonality</b>.</i>
<b>treble</b>	Sing treble. <i>She turned back to make a double and <b>treble</b> check.</i>
<b>tremolo</b>	A mechanism in an organ producing a tremolo effect.
<b>whistle</b>	Blow a whistle especially as a signal. <i>The bullets <b>whistled</b> past him.</i>
