### **agitation**

A state of agitation or turbulent change or development.  
*The techniques mostly involve **agitation** by stirring.*

### **chaos**

The first created being, from which came the primeval deities Gaia, Tartarus, Erebus, and Nyx.  
*Snow caused **chaos** in the region.*

### **choppiness**

Used of the sea during inclement or stormy weather.

### **conflict**

An open clash between two opposing groups (or individuals)-Thomas Paine.  
*Bewildered by her own inner **conflict** she could only stand there feeling vulnerable.*

### **confusion**

Uncertainty about what is happening, intended, or required.  
*There is some **confusion** between unlawful and illegal.*

### **disorder**

A state of confusion.  
*Recurrent food crises led to outbreaks of **disorder**.*

<b>disruption</b>	Disturbance or problems which interrupt an event, activity, or process. <i>The scheme was planned to minimize <b>disruption</b>.</i>
<u><b>disturbance</b></u>	Electrical or acoustic activity that can disturb communication. <i>He looked around for the source of the <b>disturbance</b>.</i>
<b>ferment</b>	A substance capable of bringing about fermentation. <i>A period of political and religious <b>ferment</b>.</i>
<b>heaviness</b>	The quality of food being hard to digest. <i>A certain <b>heaviness</b> of style.</i>
<u><b>instability</b></u>	Tendency to unpredictable behaviour or erratic changes of mood. <i>She showed increasing signs of mental <b>instability</b>.</i>
<b>irregular atmospheric motion</b>	Merchandise that has imperfections; usually sold at a reduced price without the brand name.
<b>rough air currents</b>	The part of a golf course bordering the fairway where the grass is not cut short.
<b>roughness</b>	The formation of small pits in a surface as a consequence of corrosion. <i>Her voice has a throaty <b>roughness</b> to it.</i>
<b>storminess</b>	Violent passion in speech or action. <i>Frightened by the <b>storminess</b> of their argument.</i>
<b>sturm und drang</b>	A state of violent disturbance and disorder (as in politics or social conditions generally).
<b>tempestuousness</b>	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development.
<b>troubles</b>	An angry disturbance. <i>He wanted to die and end his <b>troubles</b>.</i>
<b>tumult</b>	Violent agitation. <i>A <b>tumult</b> of shouting and screaming broke out.</i>
<b>turbulency</b>	Unstable flow of a liquid or gas.
<u><b>turmoil</b></u>	Violent agitation. <i>He endured years of inner <b>turmoil</b>.</i>
<u><b>unrest</b></u>	A state of dissatisfaction, disturbance, and agitation, typically involving public demonstrations or disorder. <i>Social <b>unrest</b>.</i>
<u><b>upheaval</b></u>	A state of violent disturbance and disorder (as in politics or social conditions generally). <i>Major <b>upheavals</b> in the financial markets.</i>



**violence**

An act of aggression (as one against a person who resists).  
*The storm s **violence**.*

**wildness**

Strength of emotion.  
*The **wildness** of the nightlife.*

<b>agitation</b>	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>Widespread <b>agitation</b> for social reform.</i>
<b>bedlam</b>	An institution for the care of mentally ill people. <i>There was <b>bedlam</b> in the courtroom.</i>
<b>brouhaha</b>	A noisy and overexcited reaction or response to something. <i>All that election <b>brouhaha</b>.</i>
<b>cataclysmic</b>	Severely destructive. <i><b>Cataclysmic</b> nuclear war.</i>
<b>chaos</b>	The property of a complex system whose behaviour is so unpredictable as to appear random, owing to great sensitivity to small changes in conditions. <i>Snow caused <b>chaos</b> in the region.</i>



<u>clamor</u>	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>He <b>clamored</b> for justice and tolerance.</i>
clatter	Fall or move with a clatter. <i>The <b>clatter</b> of iron wheels on cobblestones.</i>
<u>commotion</u>	The act of making a noisy disturbance. <i>They set off firecrackers to make a lot of <b>commotion</b>.</i>
convulsion	A physical disturbance such as an earthquake or upheaval. <i>The <b>convulsions</b> of 1939 45.</i>
<u>din</u>	A loud, unpleasant, and prolonged noise. <i>He <b>dinned</b> the lessons into his students.</i>
disorder	Bring disorder to. <i>The doctor prescribed some medicine for the <b>disorder</b>.</i>
<u>disturbance</u>	A psychological disorder of thought or emotion; a more neutral term than mental illness. <i>There was a <b>disturbance</b> of neural function.</i>
<u>flap</u>	An act of flapping something typically a wing or arm up and down or from side to side. <i><b>Flaps</b> are normally moved by the hydraulics.</i>
fluctuation	The quality of being unsteady and subject to changes. <i><b>Fluctuations</b> in the yearly values could be caused by a variety of factors.</i>
<u>flutter</u>	An act of fluttering. <i>The seagulls <b>fluttered</b> overhead.</i>
hubbub	A busy, noisy situation. <i>She fought through the <b>hubbub</b>.</i>
<u>instability</u>	A lack of balance or state of disequilibrium. <i>Political and economic <b>instability</b>.</i>
<u>mayhem</u>	Violent and needless disturbance. <i>Complete <b>mayhem</b> broke out.</i>
midst	The location of something surrounded by other things. <i>In the <b>midst</b> of the crowd.</i>
pandemonium	Wild and noisy disorder or confusion; uproar. <i>There was complete <b>pandemonium</b> everyone just panicked.</i>
perturbation	A cause of anxiety or uneasiness. <i>The term distress connotes some degree of <b>perturbation</b> and emotional upset.</i>
quake	An earthquake. <i>A little <b>quake</b> of delayed shock nudged her.</i>

<b>racket</b>	A snowshoe resembling a racket. <i>A squash <b>racket</b>.</i>
<b><u>riot</u></b>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i><b>Riots</b> broke out in the capital.</i>
<b>shakeup</b>	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>Top officials were forced out in the cabinet <b>shakeup</b>.</i>
<b>tumult</b>	A loud, confused noise, especially one caused by a large mass of people. <i>The whole neighbourhood was in a state of fear and <b>tumult</b>.</i>
<b><u>turmoil</u></b>	Disturbance usually in protest. <i>The country was in <b>turmoil</b>.</i>
<b><u>unrest</u></b>	A feeling of disturbance and dissatisfaction in a person. <i>Social <b>unrest</b>.</i>
<b><u>upheaval</u></b>	(geology) a rise of land to a higher elevation (as in the process of mountain building). <i>Times of political <b>upheaval</b>.</i>
<b><u>uproar</u></b>	A loud and impassioned noise or disturbance. <i>The room was in an <b>uproar</b>.</i>
