Associations of "Turn a blind eye" (30 Words)

askance	(used especially of glances) directed to one side with or as if with doubt or suspicion or envy. <i>The reformers looked askance at the mystical tradition.</i>
behold	See or observe (someone or something, especially of remarkable or impressive nature). <i>The botanical gardens were a wonder to behold.</i>
binoculars	(plural) an optical instrument designed for simultaneous use by both eyes.
blindly	Without seeing or looking. <i>She began groping blindly in the dark.</i>
blink	Try to control or prevent tears by blinking. <i>He doesn't blink at the unsavoury aspects of his subject.</i>
blinking	Closing the eyes intermittently and rapidly. <i>Computers can be a blinking nuisance to operators.</i>
chauvinism	Fanatical patriotism. <i>Cultural chauvinism.</i>
crippled	Severely damaged or malfunctioning. <i>The pilot displayed skill and nerve in landing the crippled plane.</i>
eyelid	Each of the upper and lower folds of skin which cover the eye when closed.
eyesight	A person's ability to see. <i>Poor eyesight ended his plans for a naval career.</i>
flicker	Move back and forth very rapidly. <i>The flicker of an eyelid.</i>
gaze	A long fixed look. <i>Offices screened from the public gaze.</i>

leer	A suggestive or sneering look or grin. <i>Bystanders were leering at the nude painting.</i>
macroscopic	Relating to large-scale or general analysis.
ocular	Combination of lenses at the viewing end of optical instruments. Ocular diseases.
oculist	A person skilled in testing for defects of vision in order to prescribe corrective glasses. <i>He visited an oculist in Chicago who prescribed a pair of reading glasses.</i>
optic	A lens or other optical component in an optical instrument. <i>An optical illusion.</i>
seeing	The action of seeing someone or something. <i>He had given the seeing as fair.</i>
shortsightedness	A lack of prudence and care by someone in the management of resources.
sidelong	Directed to or from one side. <i>Shot out sidelong boughs.</i>
sight	Catch sight of to perceive with the eyes. <i>Tell me when you sight London Bridge.</i>
sightless	Invisible. <i>Blank sightless eyes.</i>
squint	Be cross eyed have a squint or strabismus. <i>The bright sun made them squint.</i>
stare	(of a person's eyes) be wide open, with a fixed or vacant expression. <i>She gave him a cold stare.</i>
telescopic	Relating to or made with a telescope. Telescopic data.
unnamed	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>The unnamed man was found unconscious.</i>
vision	The images seen on a television screen. <i>He had visions of becoming the Elton John of his time.</i>
visual	Relating to or using sight. <i>Colour visuals of today s models.</i>
watch	A watchman or group of watchmen who patrolled and guarded the streets of a town before the introduction of the police force. <i>Lucy watched him go.</i>
