| balanced | Taking everything into account; fairly judged or presented. <i>She assembled a balanced team.</i> |
| <u>coincidence</u> | The fact of corresponding in nature or in time of occurrence. <i>The interval determining the coincidence gate is adjustable.</i> |
| concurrent | (of two or more prison sentences) to be served at the same time. <i>He received concurrent sentences of two years imprisonment for each of his two convictions.</i> |
| <u>counterbalance</u> | A weight that balances another weight. <i>The sitter's weight counterbalances the tilting pressure on the backrest.</i> |
| <u>decent</u> | Decently clothed. <i>People need decent homes.</i> |
| disinterested | Unaffected by self-interest. <i>Her father was so disinterested in her progress that he only visited the school once.</i> |
| dispassion | Objectivity and detachment. <i>Her manner assumed a dispassion and dryness very unlike her usual tone.</i> |
| equal | Be equal to in quality or ability. <i>His work is concerned with why private property equals exploitation.</i> |
| <u>equalize</u> | Make uniform in application or effect. <i>Morgan equalized ten minutes into the second half.</i> |
| <u>equally</u> | In the same manner or to the same extent. <i>Deal equally with rich and poor.</i> |
| equipoise | Balance of forces or interests. <i>Capital flows act as an equipoise to international imbalances in savings.</i> |
| equitable | Fair to all parties as dictated by reason and conscience. <i>The equitable distribution of resources.</i> |

| equity | The difference between the market value of a property and the claims held against it. <i>He owns 62 of the group s equity.</i> |
| evenhanded | Without partiality. <i>Evenhanded justice.</i> |
| hap | An accidental happening. <i>He recorded all the little haps and mishaps of his life.</i> |
| happenstance | An event that might have been arranged although it was really accidental. <i>It was just happenstance that I happened to be there.</i> |
| honest | Free of deceit; truthful and sincere. <i>Honest lawyers.</i> |
| impartial | Free from undue bias or preconceived opinions. <i>The impartial eye of a scientist.</i> |
| justice | A public official authorized to decide questions brought before a court of justice. <i>The justice of his case.</i> |
| outspoken | Characterized by directness in manner or speech; without subtlety or evasion. <i>It is possible to be outspoken without being rude.</i> |
| righteousness | The quality of being morally right or justifiable. <i>We had little doubt about the righteousness of our cause.</i> |
| same | Similarly in the same way. <i>This road is the same one we were on yesterday.</i> |
| sportsmanship | Fair and generous behaviour or treatment of others, especially in a sporting contest. <i>He displayed great sportsmanship in defeat.</i> |
| straightness | Having honest intentions. |
| symmetrical | Having similarity in size, shape, and relative position of corresponding parts. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and symmetrical.</i> |
| truthful | Conforming to truth. <i>A truthful person.</i> |
| unbiased | Characterized by a lack of partiality. <i>An unbiased account of her family problems.</i> |
| unprejudiced | Not having or showing a dislike or distrust based on fixed or preconceived ideas. <i>An unprejudiced reading of the New Testament.</i> |

unpretentious Exhibiting restrained good taste.

veracious Precisely accurate.
