According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tutor” as a noun can have the following definitions:

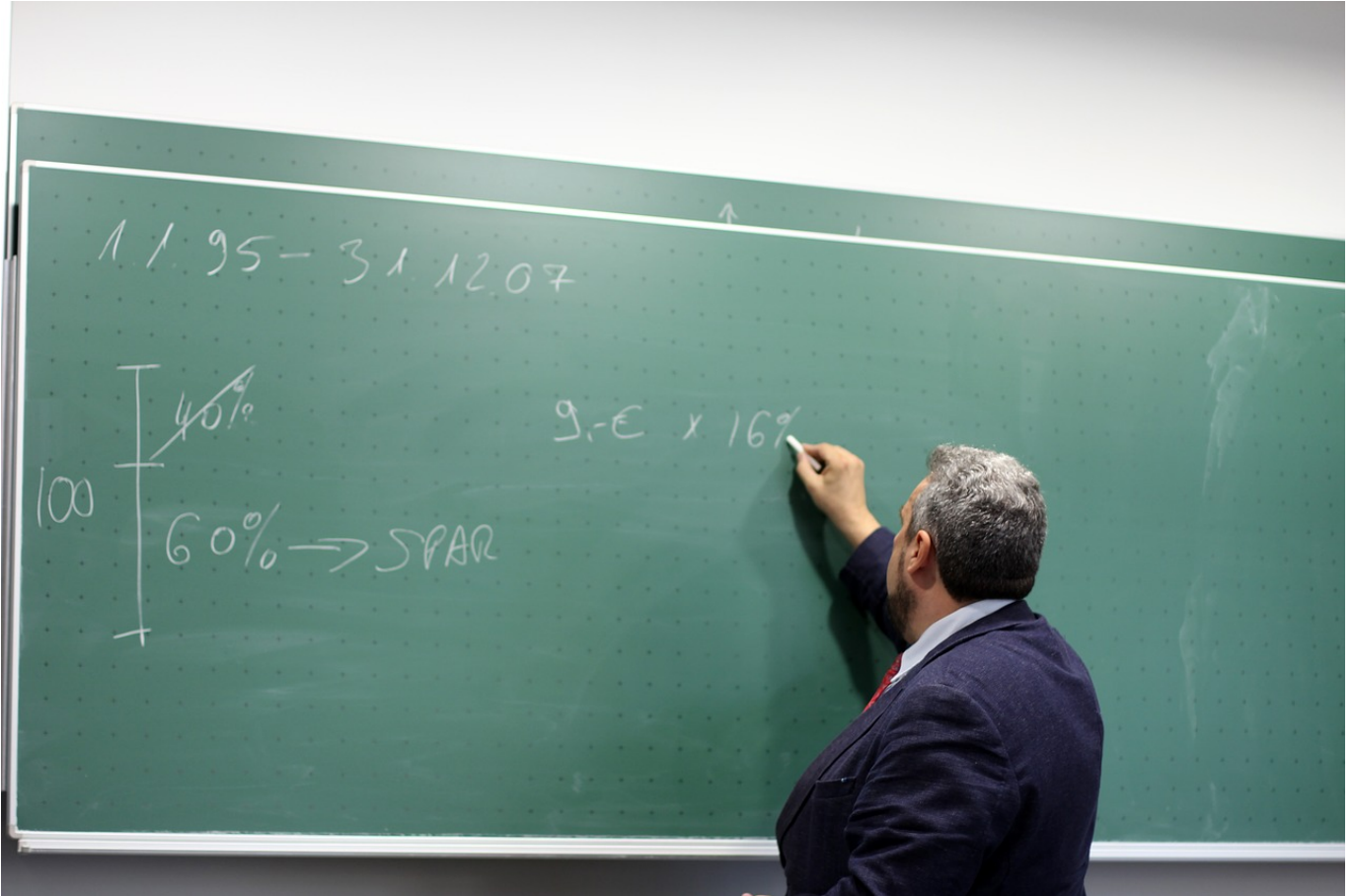
- *An assistant lecturer in a college or university.*

<b>reader</b>	A proofreader. <i>A meter <b>reader</b>.</i>
<b>researcher</b>	A person whose job involves discovering or verifying information for use in a book, programme, etc. <i>A medical <b>researcher</b> who pioneered the development of antibiotics.</i>
<b><u>scholar</u></b>	A university student holding a scholarship. <i>Mr Bell declares himself no <b>scholar</b>.</i>
<b><u>teacher</u></b>	A personified abstraction that teaches. <i>Books were his <b>teachers</b>.</i>
<b>university teacher</b>	The body of faculty and students at a university.

- groom** Educate for a future role or function.  
*The horses were **groomed** and taken to shows.*

- guide** Use as a guide.  
*Information is available to **guide** you through the planning and development process.*
- instruct** Give instructions or directions for some task.  
*He **instructed** me in building a boat.*
- school** Send to school educate.  
*The children are **school**ed at great cost to their parents in private institutions.*
- teach** Work as a teacher.  
*She **teaches** at the local high school.*
- train** Create by training and teaching.  
*The horse was **trained** in Paris.*
- upskill** Teach (an employee) additional skills.  
*They will provide grants of up to 75 for staff who decide to **upskill**.*

### academy

A society or institution of distinguished scholars and artists or scientists that aims to promote and maintain standards in its particular field.

*A police **academy**.*

### campus

The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution.

*For the first year I had a room on **campus**.*

### **coach**

Teach and supervise someone act as a trainer or coach to as in sports.

*Fly or **coach** to the shores of the Mediterranean.*



<b>college</b>	The body of faculty and students of a college. <i>The Oxford <b>colleges</b>.</i>
<b>diploma</b>	A certificate awarded by an educational establishment to show that someone has successfully completed a course of study.
<b>disciple</b>	A personal follower of Christ during his life, especially one of the twelve Apostles. <i>A <b>disciple</b> of Rousseau.</i>
<b>educate</b>	Teach or refine to be discriminative in taste or judgment. <i>She was <b>educated</b> at a boarding school.</i>
<b>educator</b>	Someone who educates young people. <i>The perspective of a professional <b>educator</b>.</i>
<b>grad</b>	One-hundredth of a right angle.
<b>guru</b>	An influential teacher or popular expert. <i>A management <b>guru</b>.</i>
<b>headmaster</b>	Presiding officer of a school.
<b>homeroom</b>	A classroom in which all students in a particular grade (or in a division of a grade) meet at certain times under the supervision of a teacher who takes attendance and does other administrative business.
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>The arms have been <b>matriculated</b> by the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Edinburgh.</i>
<b>mentor</b>	An experienced person in a company or educational institution who trains and counsels new employees or students. <i>Regular meetings between <b>mentor</b> and trainee help guide young engineers through their early years.</i>
<b>pedagogics</b>	The principles and methods of instruction.
<b>pedagogy</b>	The method and practice of teaching, especially as an academic subject or theoretical concept. <i><b>Pedagogy</b> is recognized as an important profession.</i>
<b>protege</b>	A person who receives support and protection from an influential patron who furthers the protege s career.
<b>pupil</b>	A young person attending school (up through senior high school). <i>They are former <b>pupils</b> of the school.</i>
<b>school</b>	The pupils and staff of a school. <i>A <b>school</b> of small glittering fish swam by.</i>
<b>schoolmaster</b>	A male teacher in a school.

<b>semester</b>	Half a year; a period of 6 months. <i>The opening week of Harvard s autumn <b>semester</b>.</i>
<b>student</b>	A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. <i>A maths <b>student</b>.</i>
<b>studying</b>	Reading carefully with intent to remember.
<b>teach</b>	A teacher. <i>He came one day each week to <b>teach</b> painting.</i>
<b><u>teacher</u></b>	A person who teaches, especially in a school. <i>Experience is a demanding <b>teacher</b>.</i>
<b><u>tuition</u></b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately). <i><b>Tuition</b> and room and board were more than 25 000.</i>
<b>tutelage</b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately). <i>The organizations remained under firm government <b>tutelage</b>.</i>
<b>tutorship</b>	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
<b>undergraduate</b>	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford <b>undergraduates</b>.</i>
<b><u>university</u></b>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>His daughter is at <b>university</b>.</i>
