Associations of "Tutoring" (30 Words)

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| academy | A secondary school, in the US typically a private one. <i>A police academy.</i> |
| campus | The grounds and buildings of a university or college. <i>For the first year I had a room on campus.</i> |
| coach | Teach and supervise someone act as a trainer or coach to as in sports. <i>Fly or coach to the shores of the Mediterranean.</i> |
| college | The teaching staff and students of a college considered collectively. <i>I m at college studying graphic design.</i> |
| diploma | An official document or charter. |
| disciple | A personal follower of Christ during his life, especially one of the twelve Apostles. <i>A disciple of Rousseau.</i> |
| educate | Give an education to. <i>We must educate our youngsters better.</i> |
| educator | Someone who educates young people. <i>The perspective of a professional educator.</i> |
| grad | A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university). |
| guru | Each of the ten first leaders of the Sikh religion. <i>A guru of genomics.</i> |
| headmaster | Presiding officer of a school. |
| homeroom | A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes. |
| matriculate | A person who has matriculated. <i>He was matriculated at Balliol College Oxford.</i> |
| mentor | Serve as a teacher or trusted counselor. <i>The famous professor mentored him during his years in graduate school.</i> |

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| pedagogics | The principles and methods of instruction. |
| pedagogy | The principles and methods of instruction. <i>The relationship between applied linguistics and language pedagogy.</i> |
| protege | A person who receives support and protection from an influential patron who furthers the protege's career. |
| pupil | A trainee barrister. <i>They are former pupils of the school.</i> |
| <u>school</u> | Educate in or as if in a school. <i>The Frankfurt school of critical theory.</i> |
| schoolmaster | Presiding officer of a school. |
| semester | A half-year term in a school or university, especially in North America, typically lasting for fifteen to eighteen weeks. <i>The opening week of Harvard's autumn semester.</i> |
| student | A learner who is enrolled in an educational institution. <i>A group of student nurses.</i> |
| studying | Reading carefully with intent to remember. |
| teach | A teacher. <i>She teaches at the local high school.</i> |
| <u>teacher</u> | A personified abstraction that teaches. <i>A history teacher.</i> |
| <u>tuition</u> | A fee paid for instruction (especially for higher education). <i>Tuition and room and board were more than 25 000.</i> |
| tutelage | Instruction; tuition. <i>He felt privileged to be under the tutelage of an experienced actor.</i> |
| tutorship | Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately). |
| undergraduate | Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>Undergraduate students.</i> |
| <u>university</u> | The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>His daughter is at university.</i> |
