- adjustment** The process of adapting or becoming used to a new situation.
*For many couples there may need to be a period of **adjustment**.*
- alteration** An event that occurs when something passes from one state or phase to another.
Alterations had to be made.
- change** Money given in exchange for the same sum in larger units.
*A **change** of socks.*
- modification** The grammatical relation that exists when a word qualifies the meaning of the phrase.
*The neighborhood had undergone few **modifications** since his last visit years ago.*
- nip** A small sharp bite or snip.
*A strong beak which can deliver a serious **nip**.*

pinch	An act of pinching someone. <i>The pinch of the recession.</i>
sharp pull	A musical notation indicating one half step higher than the note named.
<u>squeeze</u>	A twisting squeeze. <i>Getting through that small opening was a tight squeeze.</i>
tug	A hard or sudden pull. <i>An overwhelming tug of attraction.</i>
<u>twist</u>	An act of twisting something around a stationary point. <i>Barrels with a 1 24 inch twist.</i>
<u>twitch</u>	A small noose attached to a stick, which may be twisted around the upper lip or the ear of a horse to subdue it during veterinary procedures. <i>He felt a twitch of annoyance.</i>

Definitions of "Tweak" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "tweak" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Pull or pull out sharply.*
- *Pinch or squeeze sharply.*
- *Improve (a mechanism or system) by making fine adjustments to it.*
- *Become or cause to become agitated or excited, typically from taking amphetamines or another stimulant.*
- *Adjust finely.*
- *Twist or pull (something) sharply.*

<u>adapt</u>	Adapt or conform oneself to new or different conditions. <i>Hospitals have had to be adapted for modern medical practice.</i>
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adjust	Permit small alterations or movements so as to achieve a desired fit, appearance, or result. <i>A harness that adjusts to the correct fit.</i>
alter	Make an alteration to. <i>This dress needs to be altered.</i>
change	Change clothes put on different clothes. <i>They stopped at the corner waiting for the lights to change.</i>
fine-tune	Improve or perfect by pruning or polishing.
make adjustments to	Assure the success of.
make alterations to	Act in a certain way so as to acquire.
modify	(especially of an adjective) restrict or add to the sense of (a noun). <i>Please modify this letter to make it more polite.</i>
nip	Sever or remove by pinching or snipping. <i>He nipped off a length of wire with the cutters.</i>
pick off	Pilfer or rob.
pinch	Irritate as if by a nip pinch or tear. <i>She pinched his cheek.</i>
pluck	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion. <i>She plucked a blade of grass.</i>
pull off	Remove, usually with some force or effort; also used in an abstract sense.
pull sharply	Strip of feathers.
squeeze	Squeeze or press together. <i>Sarah squeezed in beside her.</i>
tug	Tow a vessel with a tug. <i>He tugged at Tom's coat sleeve.</i>
twist	Twist or pull violently or suddenly especially so as to remove something from that to which it is attached or from where it originates. <i>He twisted himself free.</i>
twitch	Use a twitch to subdue a horse. <i>Her lips twitched and her eyelids fluttered.</i>

- *Engineers tweak the car's operating systems during the race.*
- *I just about went crazy yesterday—I was totally tweaking out.*

- *Caffeine is a natural mood elevator but if you're stressed to begin with it can kind of tweak you out.*
- *He tweaked the boy's ear.*

contortion	The act of twisting or deforming the shape of something (e.g., yourself). <i>The acrobat performed incredible contortions.</i>

disfigure	Spoil the appearance of. <i>The vandals disfigured the statue.</i>

entwine	Spin, wind, or twist together. <i>The nations histories were closely entwined.</i>
flex	The act of flexing. <i>Ridiculous flexes of exorbitant wealth.</i>
garble	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical garble.</i>
interlace	Cross or be crossed intricately together; interweave. <i>You need different software to interlace the images.</i>
kink	Form a curl curve or kink. <i>A kink in the road.</i>
meander	(of a river or road) follow a winding course. <i>The river flows in sweeping meanders.</i>
meandering	An act of following a winding course. <i>Ox bow lagoons left by the river s meanderings.</i>

nose	Of an animal thrust its nose against or into something. <i>He pushed his glasses higher on to the bridge of his nose.</i>
pinch	Make ridges into by pinching together. <i>You can pinch on the screen and all the open apps will appear.</i>
plait	Make something by forming material into a plait or plaits. <i>Plait hair.</i>
pluck	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion. <i>He plucked a tape from the shelf.</i>
pull	A handle to hold while pulling. <i>Pull one s horse to a stand.</i>
spike	Render a gun useless by plugging up the vent with a spike. <i>He queued at the soup kitchen or the spike.</i>
squeeze	A twisting squeeze. <i>I cocked the gun and squeezed the trigger.</i>
torsion	The extent to which a curve departs from being planar.
turn	Cause to change or turn into something different assume new characteristics. <i>Turn a page of a book.</i>
twist	A dance with a twisting movement of the body popular in the 1960s. <i>The wrestler twisted his shoulder.</i>
wheel	Move along on or as if on wheels or a wheeled vehicle. <i>The wheels of government began to turn.</i>
wrench	Turn something especially a nut or bolt with a wrench. <i>You will need a wrench to tighten it in position.</i>
wrest	Distort the meaning or interpretation of (something) to suit one's own interests or views. <i>Wrest power from the old government.</i>
wring	Squeeze and twist (something) to force liquid from it. <i>Gave the wet cloth a wring.</i>
