blink of an eye A reflex that closes and opens the eyes rapidly.

flash A newsflash.
*Flap wheels are ideal for grinding off fibreglass **flash**.*

heartbeat The pulsation of the heart.
*His **heartbeat** quickened as Rose approached.*

instant Instant coffee.
*Come here this **instant**.*

jiffy

A very short time (as the time it takes the eye to blink or the heart to beat).
*We ll be back in a **jiffy**.*

split second

An opening made forcibly as by pulling apart.

trice

A very short time (as the time it takes the eye to blink or the heart to beat).

wink

An act of winking.
*Barney gave him a knowing **wink**.*



Associations of "Twinkling" (30 Words)

approvingly	In a manner resulting from or revealing approval. <i>Several heads nodded approvingly at this concept.</i>
blink	Force to go away by blinking. <i>She blinked away her tears.</i>
blinking	Used to express annoyance. <i>I'll sign off however I blinking well like.</i>
eye	The region of the face surrounding the eyes. <i>He has an artist's eye.</i>
eyelid	Either of two folds of skin that can be moved to cover or open the eye.
finery	Elaborate or showy attire and accessories. <i>Officers in their blue gold and scarlet finery.</i>
<u>flicker</u>	(of a flame) burn fitfully, alternately flaring up and dying down. <i>The flicker of a candle flame caught our eyes.</i>
flickering	Shining unsteadily. <i>The flickering flames cast long shadows.</i>
freshen	(of wind) become stronger and colder. <i>The westerly wind freshened and howled dismally.</i>
glimmer	Shine faintly with a wavering light. <i>There is one glimmer of hope for Becky.</i>
glint	A small flash of light, especially a reflected one. <i>His eyes glinted angrily.</i>
<u>glistening</u>	Shining with a sparkling light. <i>Glistening bodies of swimmers.</i>
<u>grin</u>	Express with a broad smile. <i>A silly grin.</i>
<u>instant</u>	Instant coffee. <i>For an instant the moon disappeared.</i>
<u>jewel</u>	A person who is as brilliant and precious as a piece of jewelry. <i>Jeweled dresses.</i>
laugh	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. <i>She gave a loud silly laugh.</i>
<u>mischievous</u>	(of an action or statement) causing or intended to cause harm or trouble. <i>Mischievous rumors and falsehoods.</i>

moment	The n th moment of a distribution is the expected value of the n th power of the deviations from a fixed value. <i>I was waiting for the right moment to tell him.</i>
<u>nod</u>	Signify or express greeting assent or understanding by nodding. <i>The flowers were nodding in the breeze.</i>
polish	Improve or perfect by pruning or polishing. <i>Polish my shoes.</i>
shine	Make a surface shine. <i>His talent shines.</i>
<u>shiny</u>	Having a shiny surface or coating. <i>Shiny black patents.</i>
smile	Express with a smile. <i>He smiled at Shelley.</i>
smiling	Smiling with happiness or optimism Lewis Carroll. <i>It s nice to see everyone s smiling faces.</i>
spark	Produce sparks at the point where an electric circuit is interrupted. <i>There was a spark of light.</i>
<u>sparkle</u>	Shine brightly with flashes of light. <i>Unquarried marble sparkled on the hillside.</i>
<u>sparkling</u>	Lively and witty. <i>Sparkling water.</i>
trigger	Release or pull the trigger on. <i>People ask how much I weigh but I won t talk about numbers because I know that triggers me.</i>
<u>twinkle</u>	(of a star or light, or a shiny object) shine with a gleam that changes constantly from bright to faint. <i>She looked at me with a grin and a twinkle in her eye.</i>
<u>wink</u>	Signal by winking. <i>Barney gave him a knowing wink.</i>
