

flex	The action or state of flexing. She saw him <b>flex</b> his ankle and wince.
garble	A garbled account or transmission. Most readers assumed the word was a typographical <b>garble</b> .
interlace	Mingle or intersperse something with. Jane <b>interlace</b> d her fingers to form a cup.
<u>ironic</u>	Happening in a way contrary to what is expected, and typically causing wry amusement because of this. <i>Madness an ironic fate for such a clear thinker.</i>
ironical	Characterized by often poignant difference or incongruity between what is expected and what actually is. It was <b>ironical</b> that the well planned scheme failed so completely.
kink	Form a curl curve or kink. The river <b>kink</b> s violently in a right angle.
meander	(of a river or road) follow a winding course. <i>Kids <b>meander</b>ed in and out.</i>
meandering	Following a winding course. Meandering rivers flow at vastly different rates.



perverse	Resistant to guidance or discipline. A <b>perverse</b> mood.
plait	Form hair straw rope or other material into a plait or plaits. She wore her dark hair in <b>plait</b> s.
sinuous	Gracefully thin and bending and moving with ease. The river follows a <b>sinuous</b> trail through the dale.
turn	Turning or twisting around in place. The big wheel was <b>turn</b> ing.
<u>twisted</u>	(of a personality or a way of thinking) unpleasantly or unhealthily abnormal; warped. <i>The crash left a trail of <b>twisted</b> metal across the carriageway.</i>
<u>weave</u>	A particular style or manner in which something is woven. <i>He <b>weave</b>s colourful cinematic plots.</i>
wind	Make a baby bring up wind after feeding by patting its back. <i>He waited while Jez got his <b>wind</b> back.</i>
winding	The act of winding or twisting. Our bedroom was at the top of a <b>winding</b> staircase.
worm	Used in names of long slender insect larvae especially those in fruit or wood e g army worm woodworm. I <b>worm</b> ed my way along the roadside ditch.
wriggle	A wriggling movement. She <b>wriggle</b> d her bare brown toes.
<u>writhe</u>	Respond with great emotional or physical discomfort to (an intense or unpleasant feeling or thought. <i>He writhe</i> d in agony on the ground.
wry	(of the neck or features) distorted or turned to one side. A remedy for <b>wry</b> necks.
