### **aberrant**

Departing from an accepted standard.  
***Aberrant** chromosomes.*

### **abnormal**

Not normal; not typical or usual or regular or conforming to a norm.  
*Participants with **abnormal** results were invited to undergo further diagnostic testing.*

### **corrupt**

Touched by rot or decay.  
*Humanity they knew to be **corrupt** from the day of Adam s creation.*

### **corrupted**

Containing errors or alterations.  
*Spoke a **corrupted** version of the language.*

### **debased**

Reduced in quality or value.  
*A **debased** currency.*

<b>debauched</b>	Indulging in or characterized by excessive indulgence in sex, alcohol, or drugs. <i>Congreve draws a <b>debauched</b> aristocratic society.</i>
<b>degenerate</b>	(of an energy level) corresponding to more than one quantum state. <i><b>Degenerate</b> offshoots from the main line of vertebrate progress.</i>
<b>depraved</b>	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>He was a <b>depraved</b> lecher.</i>
<b>deviant</b>	Markedly different from an accepted norm. <i>A <b>deviant</b> ideology.</i>
<b><u>distorted</u></b>	Giving a misleading or false account or impression; misrepresented. <i><b>Distorted</b> guitars.</i>
<b>evil</b>	Of a force or spirit embodying or associated with the forces of the devil. <i><b>Evil</b> purposes.</i>
<b>ghoulish</b>	Morbidly interested in death or disaster. <i>She told the story with <b>ghoulish</b> relish.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	Damaged inanimate objects or their value. <i>Dogs and cats with <b>hurt</b> paws.</i>
<b><u>macabre</u></b>	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i><b>Macabre</b> tortures conceived by madmen.</i>
<b>misrepresented</b>	Having an intended meaning altered or misrepresented.
<b><u>morbid</u></b>	Caused by or altered by or manifesting disease or pathology. <i>The treatment of <b>morbid</b> obesity.</i>
<b><u>perverted</u></b>	Deviating from what is considered moral or right or proper or good. <i>This sudden surge of <b>perverted</b> patriotism.</i>
<b>sadistic</b>	Deriving pleasure from inflicting pain, suffering, or humiliation on others. <i>She took a <b>sadistic</b> pleasure in tormenting him.</i>
<b><u>undesirable</u></b>	Not worthy of being chosen (especially as a spouse). <i>Legislation excluding <b>undesirable</b> aliens.</i>
<b><u>unhealthy</u></b>	Not conducive to good health. <i>An <b>unhealthy</b> diet.</i>
<b>unnatural</b>	Contrary to the ordinary course of nature; abnormal. <i>The formal tone of the programmes caused them to sound stilted and <b>unnatural</b>.</i>
<b>unwholesome</b>	Detrimental to physical or moral well-being. <i>The use of the living room as sleeping quarters led to <b>unwholesome</b> crowding.</i>

<b>warped</b>	Used especially of timbers or boards; bent out of shape usually by moisture. <i>The floors were <b>warped</b> and cracked.</i>
<b>wicked</b>	Excellent; wonderful. <i>Under <b>wicked</b> fire from the enemy s guns.</i>

- *Suffering a twisted ankle, he was carried from the field.*

<b>artful</b>	Not straightforward or candid; giving a false appearance of frankness- David Cannadine. <i>Her <b>artful</b> wiles.</i>
<b>askew</b>	Turned or twisted toward one side. <i>The judging was a bit <b>askew</b>.</i>
<b>asymmetrical</b>	Having parts or aspects that are not equal or equivalent; unequal. <i><b>Asymmetrical</b> features.</i>
<b>bent</b>	Fixed in your purpose. <i>A piece of <b>bent</b> wire.</i>
<b>crooked</b>	Irregular in shape or outline. <i><b>Crooked</b> country roads.</i>

<b>curve</b>	Form an arch or curve. <i>He relies on a couple of <b>curves</b> and a modest fastball.</i>
<b>disingenuous</b>	Not straightforward or candid; giving a false appearance of frankness- David Cannadine. <i>This journalist was being somewhat <b>disingenuous</b> as well as cynical.</i>
<b>distorted</b>	So badly formed or out of shape as to be ugly. <i>His report gives a <b>distorted</b> view of the meeting.</i>
<b>exaggerated</b>	Regarded or represented as larger, better, or worse than in reality. <i>Thick lenses <b>exaggerated</b> the size of her eyes.</i>
<b>garble</b>	A garbled account or transmission. <i>Most readers assumed the word was a typographical <b>garble</b>.</i>
<b>gnarled</b>	Knobbly, rough, and twisted, especially with age. <i><b>Gnarled</b> and knotted hands.</i>
<b>hooked</b>	Having or resembling a hook (especially in the ability to grasp and hold). <i>A girl who got <b>hooked</b> on cocaine.</i>
<b>insincere</b>	Lacking sincerity. <i>She flashed him an <b>insincere</b> smile.</i>
<b>lopsided</b>	With one side lower or smaller than the other. <i>A <b>lopsided</b> grin.</i>
<b>manipulative</b>	Relating to manipulation of an object or part of the body. <i>The early <b>manipulative</b> techniques of a three year old child.</i>
<b>morbid</b>	Of the nature of or indicative of disease. <i>A <b>morbid</b> growth.</i>
<b>refractive</b>	Of or relating to or capable of refraction. <i>The <b>refractive</b> characteristics of the eye.</i>
<b>turn</b>	The act of turning away or in the opposite direction. <i>There was still the sea by way of which the Persians hoped to <b>turn</b> all mountain or isthmus defence lines.</i>
<b>twist</b>	Force producing twisting torque. <i>Her pretty features <b>twisted</b> into a fearsome expression.</i>
<b>underhand</b>	Acting or done in a secret or dishonest way. <i><b>Underhand</b> bowling.</i>
<b>underhanded</b>	With hand brought forward and up from below shoulder level. <i><b>Underhanded</b> practices.</i>
<b>warped</b>	Abnormal or strange; distorted. <i>A <b>warped</b> sense of humour.</i>

- wily** Skilled at gaining an advantage, especially deceitfully.  
*A **wily** old attorney.*
- wind** Wind instruments or specifically woodwind instruments forming a band or a section of an orchestra.  
*The birds could not have seen us or **winded** us.*
- winding** The act of winding or twisting.  
***Winding** roads are full of surprises.*
- worm** An earthworm.  
*I did manage to **worm** a few details out of him.*
- wrest** Obtain by seizing forcibly or violently, also metaphorically.  
***Wrest** power from the old government.*
- wry** (of a person's face or features) twisted into an expression of disgust, disappointment, or annoyance.  
*A **wry** neck.*
- zigzag** A turn on a zigzag course.  
*The path **zigzagged** between dry rises in the land.*
