dunce A stupid person; these words are used to express a low opinion of someone's intelligence.

fool A person who is gullible and easy to take advantage of.

*I felt a bit of a **fool**.*

halfwit	A foolish or stupid person. <i>Worst of all were the halfwits in the background guffawing at every pathetic gag.</i>
idiot	A person of low intelligence.
ignoramus	An ignorant or stupid person. <i>Assume that your examiner is an ignoramus and explain everything to him.</i>
imbecile	A person of subnormal intelligence.
nincompoop	A foolish or stupid person.
<u>simpleton</u>	A foolish or gullible person. <i>Stop grinning at me like a simpleton.</i>
taunt	Aggravation by deriding or mocking or criticizing. <i>Pupils will play truant rather than face the taunts of classmates about their ragged clothes.</i>
taunting	Aggravation by deriding or mocking or criticizing.
twerp	A silly or annoying person.
twirp	Someone who is regarded as contemptible.

- *Harass with persistent criticism or carping.*

<u>bait</u>	Put bait on a hook or in a trap net or fishing area to entice fish or animals. <i>People who bait badgers.</i>
cod	Fool or hoax.
rag	Give a decorative effect to a painted surface by applying paint typically of a different colour with a rag. <i>Rag ore.</i>
<u>rally</u>	Drive in a rally. <i>A series of meetings to rally support for the union.</i>

- razz** Tease (someone) playfully.
*His co workers **razz** him about it.*
- ride** Ride over along or through.
*I **ride** to work in a bus.*
- tantalise** Harass with persistent criticism or carping.
- tantalize** Excite the senses or desires of (someone).
*She still **tantalized** him.*
- taunt** Reproach (someone) with something in a contemptuous way.
*Pupils began **taunting** her about her weight.*
- tease** Raise the nap of (fabrics).
***Tease** the roots apart and replant at once.*

- foolhardy** Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences-Macaulay.
*It would be **foolhardy** to go into the scheme without support.*
- foolish** Devoid of good sense or judgment.
*He was **foolish** enough to confide in her.*

goofy	A cartoon character created by Walt Disney. <i>Wore a goofy hat.</i>
idiot	A person of subnormal intelligence.
idiotic	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>I was able to hum its idiotic theme tune.</i>
imbecile	A stupid person. <i>Try not to make imbecile remarks.</i>
inadvisable	Not advisable. <i>It would be inadvisable to involve more than one architect.</i>
inane	Lacking sense or meaning; silly. <i>Don't badger people with inane questions.</i>
oaf	A man who is rough or clumsy and unintelligent. <i>They are just big clumsy oafs.</i>
patsy	A person who is easily taken advantage of, especially by being cheated or blamed for something. <i>There is a mischievous sparkle in his eyes that suggests he is no patsy.</i>
ridiculous	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Her conceited assumption of universal interest in her rather dull children was ridiculous.</i>
silly	Ludicrous, foolish. <i>Come on silly.</i>
simpleton	A person lacking intelligence or common sense. <i>Stop grinning at me like a simpleton.</i>
sucker	Of a plant produce suckers. <i>He's one strong sucker.</i>
vacuity	Total lack of meaning or ideas. <i>He denounced what he considered the frivolity or vacuity of much contemporary painting.</i>
vacuous	Void of expression. <i>Vacuous comments.</i>
zany	A zany person. <i>A zany sense of humor.</i>
