### Twitch as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Twitch" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "twitch" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Move with abrupt, seemingly uncontrolled motions.
- Use a twitch to subdue (a horse).
- Toss with a sharp movement so as to cause to turn over in the air.



- Cause to move in a specified direction by giving a sharp pull.
- Move or pull with a sudden motion.
- Make an uncontrolled, short, jerky motion.
- Squeeze tightly between the fingers.
- Give or cause to give a short, sudden jerking or convulsive movement.
