tug	A loop from a horse's saddle which supports a shaft or trace. <i>Another tug and it came loose.</i>
<u>tweak</u>	A fine adjustment to a mechanism or system. <i>No tweaks were required.</i>
twinge	A sudden, sharp localized pain. <i>Kate felt a twinge of guilt.</i>
twitching	A sudden muscle spasm; especially one caused by a nervous condition.
vellication	A sudden muscle spasm; especially one caused by a nervous condition.

Twitch as a Verb

Definitions of "Twitch" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "twitch" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Move with abrupt, seemingly uncontrolled motions.*
- *Use a twitch to subdue (a horse).*
- *Toss with a sharp movement so as to cause to turn over in the air.*

- Cause to move in a specified direction by giving a sharp pull.
- Move or pull with a sudden motion.
- Make an uncontrolled, short, jerky motion.
- Squeeze tightly between the fingers.
- Give or cause to give a short, sudden jerking or convulsive movement.

Synonyms of "Twitch" as a verb (22 Words)

convulse	Make someone convulse with laughter. <i>Earthquakes convulsed the countryside.</i>
<u>flip</u>	Toss with a sharp movement so as to cause to turn over in the air. <i>He flipped when he heard that he was being laid off.</i>
<u>flutter</u>	Flap the wings rapidly or fly with flapping movements. <i>The seagulls fluttered overhead.</i>
move convulsively	Progress by being changed.
move spasmodically	Perform an action, or work out or perform (an action).
nip	Sever or remove by pinching or snipping. <i>One of the dogs nipped him on the leg.</i>
pinch	Make ridges into by pinching together. <i>To explore in more detail just pinch the screen.</i>
pluck	Pull lightly but sharply with a plucking motion. <i>Pluck the flowers off the bush.</i>
pull	Bring take or pull out of a container or from under a cover. <i>I am never likely to get pulled for speeding.</i>
quaver	(of a person's voice) shake or tremble in speaking, typically through nervousness or emotion. <i>I m not safe here am I she said in a quavering voice.</i>
<u>quiver</u>	Move back and forth very rapidly. <i>The tree s branches stopped quivering.</i>
shiver	Shake slightly and uncontrollably as a result of being cold, frightened, or excited. <i>They shivered in the damp foggy cold.</i>
<u>shudder</u>	(especially of a vehicle, machine, or building) shake or vibrate violently. <i>I shuddered with horror.</i>
<u>spasm</u>	Experience sudden involuntary muscular contractions; twitch convulsively. <i>My body spasmed violently.</i>

squeeze	Squeeze or press together. <i>The outer stalk remains once the juice has been squeezed from sugar cane.</i>
tremble	Be in a state of extreme apprehension. <i>I tremble to think that we could ever return to conditions like these.</i>
tug	Tow a vessel with a tug. <i>The ships were tugged off the reefs.</i>
tweak	Twist or pull (something) sharply. <i>Caffeine is a natural mood elevator but if you're stressed to begin with it can kind of tweak you out.</i>
tweet	Make a chirping noise. <i>She talks about her own life but she's just as likely to tweet about budget cuts and Keynesian economics.</i>
twinge	Cause a stinging pain. <i>Stop the exercises if the tummy twinges.</i>

jump	An act of jumping from a surface by pushing upwards with one s legs and feet. <i>The bar is jumping on Fridays and Saturdays.</i>
leap	A thing to be leaped over or from. <i>He leapt on to the parapet.</i>
move	Change location move travel or proceed also metaphorically. <i>I am a pawn and bishop down after 12 moves.</i>
muscle	A muscle or muscles when well developed or prominently visible under the skin. <i>He was eventually muscled out of the market.</i>
muscular	Having a robust muscular body build characterized by predominance of structures bone and muscle and connective tissue developed from the embryonic mesodermal layer. <i>Energy is needed for muscular activity.</i>
paroxysm	A sudden recurrence or attack of a disease. <i>A paroxysm of weeping.</i>
power	Of a government or government official holding an office means being in power. <i>The power of speech.</i>

spring	The ability to spring back strongly elasticity. <i>The springs of his own emotions.</i>
