orthodox	Of the ordinary or usual type; normal. Orthodox medical treatment.
<u>predictable</u>	Capable of being foretold. <i>The characters are stereotyped and extremely predictable.</i>
prototypical	Representing or constituting an original type after which other similar things are patterned. <i>The phone emerged as the prototypical example of point to point communication.</i>
<u>quintessential</u>	Representing the perfect example of a class or quality. <i>He was the quintessential tough guy strong silent and self contained.</i>
regular	In accord with regular practice or procedure. <i>Elkerton is a regular footer.</i>
representative	Of a government or political system based on elected or chosen representatives. <i>Churchill was not properly representative of influential opinion in Britain.</i>
routine	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>It was a routine day.</i>
run-of-the-mill	Not special in any way.
standard	Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i>A standard size.</i>
stereotypical	Relating to a widely held but fixed and oversimplified image or idea of a particular type of person or thing. <i>He fits the stereotypical masculine image of toughness.</i>

Of a product or type of product usually kept in stock and thus regularly available for sale.

A **stock** item.

unexceptional

Not special in any way; lacking distinction.

A **unexceptional** incident as can be found in a lawyer's career.

unremarkable

Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant.

An **unremarkable** house.

unsurprising

Not causing surprise.

The outcome of this sombre film is **unsurprising**.

usual

Occurring or encountered or experienced or observed frequently or in accordance with regular practice or procedure.

Came at the **usual** time.

ordinary	A clergyman appointed to prepare condemned prisoners for death. <i>The ordinary or common man in the street.</i>

pervasive	(especially of an unwelcome influence or physical effect) spreading widely throughout an area or a group of people. <i>Ageism is pervasive and entrenched in our society.</i>
prevail	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance. <i>She was prevailed upon to give an account of her work.</i>
prevalent	Most frequent or common. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i>
quotidian	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>There s nothing quite like a real train conductor to add color to a quotidian commute.</i>
routine	Organize according to a routine. <i>I settled down into a routine of work and sleep.</i>
stereotype	Treat or classify according to a mental stereotype. <i>Don t treat anyone as a stereotype.</i>
stereotyped	Lacking spontaneity or originality or individuality. <i>The film is weakened by its stereotyped characters.</i>
traditional	Produced, done, or used in accordance with tradition. <i>The traditional festivities of the Church year.</i>
tuscan	Of or relating to or characteristic of Tuscany or its people.
ubiquitous	Present, appearing, or found everywhere. <i>His ubiquitous influence was felt by all the family.</i>
