<b>command</b>	The power or authority to command. <i>He obeyed her <b>commands</b> without question.</i>
<b><u>decree</u></b>	The issuing of a decree. <i>The <b>decree</b> guaranteed freedom of assembly.</i>
<b>demand</b>	The act of demanding. <i>There were many <b>demands</b> on his time.</i>
<b><u>dictum</u></b>	A short statement that expresses a general truth or principle. <i>The old <b>dictum</b> might is right.</i>
<b>direction</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action. <i>The campaign s lack of <b>direction</b>.</i>
<b><u>directive</u></b>	An official or authoritative instruction. <i>A new EC <b>directive</b>.</i>

<b>edict</b>	A formal or authoritative proclamation. <i>Clovis issued an <b>edict</b> protecting Church property.</i>
<b>exhortation</b>	An address or communication emphatically urging someone to do something. <i>No amount of <b>exhortation</b> had any effect.</i>
<b>injunction</b>	A judicial remedy issued in order to prohibit a party from doing or continuing to do a certain activity. <i><b>Injunction</b> were formerly obtained by writ but now by a judicial order.</i>
<b>instruction</b>	Teaching; education. <i>He issued <b>instructions</b> to the sheriff.</i>
<b>mandate</b>	A document giving an official instruction or command. <i>A <b>mandate</b> to seek the release of political prisoners.</i>
<b>order</b>	The insignia worn by members of an order of honour or merit. <i>I gave the waiter my <b>order</b>.</i>
<b>ordinance</b>	A statute enacted by a city government. <i>His strict observance of religious <b>ordinances</b> was no doubt quickened by the remorse he felt.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	An authoritative declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>
<b>requirement</b>	Required activity. <i>Choose the type of window that suits your <b>requirements</b> best.</i>
<b>rule</b>	A rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>The <b>rules</b> of cricket.</i>
<b>ruling</b>	The reason for a court's judgment (as opposed to the decision itself). <i>The <b>ruling</b> was reversed in the appeal court.</i>
<b><u>stipulation</u></b>	A condition or requirement that is specified or demanded as part of an agreement. <i>A <b>stipulation</b> of fact was made in order to avoid delay.</i>

- coda** The closing section of a musical composition.  
*The first movement ends with a fortissimo **coda**.*
- completion** (American football) a successful forward pass in football.  
*The risk stays with the seller until **completion**.*
- conclude** Say in conclusion.  
*They **conclude** their study with these words.*
- conclusion** A proposition that is reached from given premises.  
*He drew his **conclusions** quickly.*
- culmination** The decisive moment in a novel or play.  
*Their achievements stand as a **culmination** of centuries of development.*
- deadline** The point in time at which something must be completed.  
*The **deadline** of 6pm passed without incident.*

<b>decease</b>	Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life. <i>He <b>deceased</b> at his palace of Croydon.</i>
<b>deciding</b>	Having the power or quality of deciding. <i>Cast the <b>deciding</b> vote.</i>
<b>demise</b>	The time when something ends. <i>The <b>demised</b> property.</i>
<b>destination</b>	Denoting a place that people will make a special trip to visit. <i>He was nearly exhausted as their <b>destination</b> came into view.</i>
<b>done</b>	No longer happening or existing. <i>The turkey will be <b>done</b> to a turn.</i>
<b>dying</b>	Gradually ceasing to exist or function; in decline and about to disappear. <i>The <b>dying</b> embers of the fire.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The <b>ending</b> of the Cold War.</i>
<b>epilogue</b>	A short speech (often in verse) addressed directly to the audience by an actor at the end of a play. <i>The meaning of the book's title is revealed in the <b>epilogue</b>.</i>
<b>eventual</b>	Expected to follow in the indefinite future from causes already operating. <i>It's impossible to predict the <b>eventual</b> outcome of the competition.</i>
<b>expiration</b>	The end of a period of time. <i>At the end of <b>expiration</b> there is still a slight inflation in the lungs.</i>
<b>expiry</b>	The end of the period for which something is valid. <i>The <b>expiry</b> of the patent.</i>
<b>final</b>	The final approach of an aircraft to the runway it will be landing on. <i>The <b>final</b> cost will easily run into six figures.</i>
<b>finale</b>	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>The festival ends with a grand <b>finale</b>.</i>
<b>finis</b>	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>The market was up at the <b>finish</b>.</i>
<b>finishing</b>	The act of finishing. <i>The speaker's <b>finishing</b> was greeted with applause.</i>
<b>last</b>	The last position or finisher in a race or competition. <i>He was the <b>last</b> to leave.</i>
<b>latter</b>	Occurring or situated nearer to the end of something than to the beginning. <i>The President appoints the Prime Minister and on the <b>latter's</b> advice the rest of the government.</i>

<b>notice</b>	Notice or perceive. <i>She had good <b>notices</b> in her first film.</i>
<b>passing</b>	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>The <b>passing</b> of the Cold War.</i>
<b>perish</b>	Be suffering from extreme cold. <i>An abandoned tyre whose rubber had <b>perished</b>.</i>
<b>peroration</b>	A flowery and highly rhetorical oration. <i>He again invoked the theme in an emotional <b>peroration</b>.</i>
<b>surrender</b>	The action of surrendering to an opponent or powerful influence. <i>The UK is opposed to <b>surrendering</b> its monetary sovereignty.</i>
<b>termination</b>	An ending or result of a specified kind. <i>A good result and a happy <b>termination</b>.</i>
<b>windup</b>	Operated by a mechanism. <i><b>Windup</b> toys.</i>
