Synonyms of "Unabated" as an adjective (22 Words)

constant	Occurring continuously over a period of time. <i>The constant background noise of the city.</i>
continual	Continual meaning seemingly uninterrupted is often used interchangeably with continuous meaning without interruption. <i>The continual banging of the shutters.</i>
continuing	Without a break in continuity; ongoing. <i>The act provided a continuing annual appropriation.</i>
continuous	Of a function or curve; extending without break or irregularity. <i>Lived in continuous fear.</i>

endless	Infinitely great in number. <i>An endless conversation.</i>
incessant	(of something regarded as unpleasant) continuing without pause or interruption. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i>
interminable	Tiresomely long; seemingly without end. <i>We got bogged down in interminable discussions.</i>
<u>lasting</u>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A long lasting friendship.</i>
never-ending	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing.
perpetual	Never ending or changing. <i>Hell's perpetual fires.</i>
persistent	Continually recurring to the mind- Claudia Cassidy. <i>Persistent leaves remain attached past maturity.</i>
<u>steady</u>	Not changing; regular and established. <i>He refilled her glass with a steady hand.</i>
sustained	Continuous. <i>Sustained flight.</i>
unabating	Not weakening or losing intensity. <i>The battle raged with unabating fury.</i>
<u>unbroken</u>	Not plowed. <i>Cars in an unbroken procession.</i>
unceasing	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>The unceasing efforts of the staff.</i>
<u>unending</u>	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>The charity rescues children from unending poverty.</i>
uninterrupted	Without a break in continuity. <i>The window gives an uninterrupted view of the mountains.</i>
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>Unrelenting opponents.</i>
unrelieved	Lacking variation or change; monotonous. <i>The burden of domestic work and childcare went largely unrelieved.</i>
<u>unremitting</u>	Never relaxing or slackening; incessant. <i>Unremitting demands of hunger.</i>
<u>unstoppable</u>	Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>As unstoppable as the wind.</i>

continued	Without stop or interruption. <i>The continued popularity of Westerns.</i>
dauntless	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i>Dauntless bravery.</i>

<u>durable</u>	Existing for a long time. <i>A durable peace can be achieved.</i>

hardy	United States slapstick comedian who played the pompous and overbearing member of the Laurel and Hardy duo who made many films (1892-1957). <i>Hardy explorers of northern Canada.</i>
<u>heavily</u>	In a way that is mentally oppressive or hard to endure. <i>He was heavily influenced by the Impressionists.</i>
husky	Breed of heavy-coated Arctic sled dog. <i>Clothing sizes for husky boys.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>Intense itching and burning.</i>
<u>intrepid</u>	Fearless; adventurous (often used for rhetorical or humorous effect). <i>Our intrepid reporter.</i>

<u>resistant</u>	Incapable of absorbing or mixing with. <i>Some of the old Churches are resistant to change.</i>
resistive	Disposed to or engaged in defiance of established authority.
<u>resolute</u>	Firm in purpose or belief; characterized by firmness and determination. <i>He was resolute in his fight to uphold liberal values.</i>
<u>restless</u>	Ceaselessly in motion. <i>The restless wind.</i>
robust	Strong enough to withstand or overcome intellectual challenges or adversity. <i>He took quite a robust view of my case.</i>
<u>stable</u>	Shelter in a stable. <i>He is now in a stable condition in hospital.</i>
<u>stalwart</u>	Dependable. <i>A stalwart knight.</i>
strong	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>Gave a strong pull on the rope.</i>
<u>sturdy</u>	Substantially made or constructed. <i>Sturdy canvas.</i>
<u>tough</u>	Physically toughened. <i>We have six tough matches in a row.</i>
<u>undeterred</u>	Not deterred. <i>He was undeterred by these disasters.</i>
unflinching	Not shrinking from danger. <i>He has shown unflinching determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<u>vehement</u>	Characterized by great force or energy. <i>A vehement defense.</i>
<u>vigorous</u>	Strong and active physically or mentally- W.H.Hudson. <i>Vigorous aerobic exercise.</i>
