positive	Having a positive charge. <i>A positive benefit.</i>

<u>staring</u>	Open and fixed as if in fear or wonder. Staring eyes.
<u>stark</u>	Completely naked. A stark contrast.
<u>thorough</u>	Taking pains to do something carefully and completely. A thorough nuisance.
thoroughgoing	Performed comprehensively and completely. A thoroughgoing villain.
<u>total</u>	Constituting the full quantity or extent; complete. A total eclipse.
unalloyed	Free from admixture. Unalloyed pleasure.
<u>unconditional</u>	Not subject to any conditions. Unconditional surrender.
uncontaminated	Not contaminated. Uncontaminated air and food.
<u>unequivocal</u>	Leaving no doubt; unambiguous. An unequivocal answer.
<u>unmitigated</u>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. Unmitigated suffering.
unmixed	Not mixed. Not an unmixed blessing.
unpolluted	Not contaminated with noxious or poisonous substances. Her mind remains unpolluted by the filth they teach her.
unqualified	Not competent or sufficiently knowledgeable to do something. I am singularly unqualified to write about football.
unsullied	(of reputation) free from blemishes. An unsullied reputation.
<u>untainted</u>	Free from blemishes. The island remains virtually untainted by commercialism.
<u>untouched</u>	Not having come in contact. No detail is left untouched .
<u>utter</u>	Complete and absolute. Utter nonsense.
<u>veritable</u>	Not counterfeit or copied. Photographs taken in a veritable bull ring.
