Definitions of "Unappreciated" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unappreciated” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Not likely to be rewarded.*
- *Having value that is not acknowledged.*
- *Not fully understood, recognized, or valued.*



Synonyms of "Unappreciated" as an adjective (10 Words)

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| overlooked | Not taken into account. |
| thankless | Not likely to be rewarded. <i>How sharper than a serpent's tooth it is To have a thankless child.</i> |
| unacknowledged | Not recognized or admitted. <i>His ideas have made a striking if largely unacknowledged comeback.</i> |
| uncredited | (of a person or their work) not publicly acknowledged as having contributed to something, especially a publication or broadcast. <i>The uncredited help of Inuit guides.</i> |
| ungratifying | Not likely to be rewarded. |
| <u>unrecognized</u> | Not acknowledged as valuable or valid. <i>He was unrecognized in his disguise.</i> |
| unrewarded | Having acquired or gained nothing. <i>He gave untiring and unrewarded service.</i> |

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| unsung | Not celebrated or praised. <i>Unsung heroes of the war.</i> |
| unthanked | Without receiving thanks. <i>The women s kind gesture did not go unthanked.</i> |
| unvalued | Not considered to be important or beneficial. <i>He felt unvalued.</i> |

Usage Examples of "Unappreciated" as an adjective

- *She had been brought up in a family where she felt unappreciated and undervalued.*

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| abstruse | Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding or knowledge. <i>An abstruse philosophical inquiry.</i> |
| blur | Make unclear indistinct or blurred. <i>The fog blurs my vision.</i> |
| classified | Arranged into classes. <i>Classified information on nuclear experiments.</i> |
| concealed | Kept secret; hidden. <i>A concealed weapon.</i> |
| elusive | Difficult to remember. <i>A haunting elusive odor.</i> |
| esoteric | Intended for or likely to be understood by only a small number of people with a specialized knowledge or interest. <i>Esoteric philosophical debates.</i> |
| hidden | Designed to elude detection. <i>Hidden valleys.</i> |
| inconspicuous | Not prominent or readily noticeable. <i>He pushed the string through an inconspicuous hole.</i> |
| indefinite | Not clearly expressed or defined; vague. <i>In Greek the dual contrasts with the indefinite plural.</i> |
| indistinct | Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand. <i>Indistinct shapes in the gloom.</i> |
| inglorious | Not bringing honor and glory. <i>Inglorious defeat.</i> |

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| <u>invisible</u> | Invisible exports and imports. <i>He lounged in a doorway invisible in the dark.</i> |
| lonely | Sad because one has no friends or company. <i>A lonely country lane.</i> |
| lonesome | Being the only one; single and isolated from others. <i>Spent a lonesome hour in the bar.</i> |
| nameless | (of a child) illegitimate. <i>The myths talk about nameless horrors infesting our universe.</i> |
| <u>obscure</u> | Make obscure or unclear. <i>An obscure village.</i> |
| <u>privacy</u> | The condition of being concealed or hidden. <i>A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people s privacy.</i> |
| recondite | Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding or knowledge. <i>Some recondite problem in historiography.</i> |
| secret | Of information given in confidence or in secret. <i>I m not trying to explain the secrets of the universe in this book.</i> |
| <u>shameful</u> | (used of conduct or character) deserving or bringing disgrace or shame. <i>A shameful display of cowardice.</i> |
| <u>stealthy</u> | Behaving or done in a cautious and surreptitious manner, so as not to be seen or heard. <i>Stealthy footsteps.</i> |
| <u>subtlety</u> | A subtle difference in meaning or opinion or attitude. <i>You had to admire the subtlety of the distinctions he drew.</i> |
| <u>trivia</u> | Something of small importance. <i>We fill our days with meaningless trivia.</i> |
| <u>undiscovered</u> | Not discovered. <i>Undiscovered islands.</i> |
| unidentified | Not yet identified. <i>An unidentified witness.</i> |
| unknown | An unknown person or thing. <i>Don t let anyone unknown into the house.</i> |
| <u>unnamed</u> | Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>An unnamed donor.</i> |
| <u>unnoticeable</u> | Not obtrusive or undesirably noticeable. <i>The reverberation will be so slight as to be unnoticeable.</i> |

unrewarding Not rewarding; not providing personal satisfaction.
*It was dull **unrewarding** work.*

unsung Having value that is not acknowledged.
*Harvey is one of the **unsung** heroes of the industrial revolution.*
