(of a person or their work) not publicly acknowledged as having contributed to something, especially a publication or broadcast.

ungratifying Not likely to be rewarded.

unrecognized Not acknowledged as valuable or valid.

He was **unrecognized** in his disguise.

unrewarded Having acquired or gained nothing.

unsung Not celebrated or praised.

Unsung heroes of the war.

unthanked Without receiving thanks.

The women s kind gesture did not go **unthanked**.

unvalued Not considered to be important or beneficial.

He felt unvalued.

hidden Hidden valleys.

inconspicuous Not prominent or readily noticeable.

He pushed the string through an **inconspicuous** hole.

indefinite Not clearly expressed or defined; vague.

In Greek the dual contrasts with the **indefinite** plural.

indistinct Not clearly defined or easy to perceive or understand.

Indistinct shapes in the gloom.

inglorious Not bringing honor and glory.

Inglorious defeat.



invisible Invisible exports and imports.

He lounged in a doorway **invisible** in the dark.

lonely Sad because one has no friends or company.

A **lonely** country lane.

lonesomeBeing the only one; single and isolated from others.

Spent a **lonesome** hour in the bar.

nameless (of a child) illegitimate.

The myths talk about **nameless** horrors infesting our universe.

Make obscure or unclear.

An **obscure** village.

The condition of being concealed or hidden.

A law to restrict newspapers freedom to invade people s **privacy**.

Difficult to penetrate; incomprehensible to one of ordinary understanding

recondite or knowledge.

Some **recondite** problem in historiography.

secret Of information given in confidence or in secret.

I m not trying to explain the **secret**s of the universe in this book.

shameful (used of conduct or character) deserving or bringing disgrace or shame.

A **shameful** display of cowardice.

Behaving or done in a cautious and surreptitious manner, so as not to be

stealthy seen or heard.

Stealthy footsteps.

A subtle difference in meaning or opinion or attitude.

You had to admire the **subtlety** of the distinctions he drew.

trivia Something of small importance.

We fill our days with meaningless **trivia**.

undiscovered Not discovered.

Undiscovered islands.

Not yet identified.

unidentified An unidentified witness.

unknown An unknown person or thing.

Don t let anyone **unknown** into the house.

Being or having an unknown or unnamed source.

unnamed An unnamed donor.

unnoticeable Not obtrusive or undesirably noticeable.

The reverberation will be so slight as to be **unnoticeable**.
