#### Synonyms of "Unassuming" as an adjective (20 Words)

bashful	Disposed to avoid notice blate is a Scottish term for bashful. I never laughed being <b>bashful</b> lowering my head I looked at the wall.
demure	(of clothing) giving a modest appearance. A <b>demure</b> young lady.
diffident	Showing modest reserve. A <b>diffident</b> youth.
humble	Of low birth or station (`base' is archaic in this sense. A <b>humble</b> cottage.
<u>insecure</u>	Lacking in security or safety. A financially <b>insecure</b> period.



<u>meek</u>	Evidencing little spirit or courage; overly submissive or compliant- Orville Prescott. A fine fiery blast against <b>meek</b> conformity.
<u>mild</u>	Mild and pleasant. <i>Mild criticism.</i>
<u>modest</u>	Free from pomp or affectation. A <b>modest</b> salary.
reserved	Marked by self-restraint and reticence. A <b>reserved</b> seat.
restrained	Prudent. The drawings with their <b>restrained</b> colours give a feeling of peace and contemplation.
<u>reticent</u>	Cool and formal in manner. She was extremely <b>reticent</b> about her personal affairs.
retiring	Shy and fond of being on one's own. A gentle <b>retiring</b> person who avoided conflict.
self-effacing	Reluctant to draw attention to yourself.
shrinking	Becoming smaller in size or amount. The <b>shrinking</b> market has provoked a massive price war.
shy	Lacking self-confidence. Otters are very <b>shy</b> animals.
<u>timid</u>	Lacking conviction or boldness or courage. Problems that call for bold not <b>timid</b> responses.
timorous	Timid by nature or revealing timidity. In a <b>timorous</b> tone.
unassertive	Inclined to timidity or lack of self-confidence. His bland and <b>unassertive</b> personal style.
<u>unconfident</u>	Not confident; hesitant. The airmen were young but not <b>unconfident</b> .
<u>withdrawn</u>	Withdrawn from society seeking solitude. When her husband died she became very <b>withdrawn</b> .

- Unassuming to a fault, skeptical about the value of his work.

<u>amiable</u>	Having or displaying a friendly and pleasant manner. The <b>amiable</b> young man greeted me enthusiastically.
<u>chivalrous</u>	Courteous and gallant, especially towards women (typically used of a man or his behaviour. <i>The concept of chivalrous combat.</i>
<u>chivalry</u>	Courteous behaviour, especially that of a man towards women. <i>He still retained a sense of <b>chivalry</b> towards women.</i>
<u>civility</u>	The act of showing regard for others. I hope we can treat each other with <b>civility</b> and respect.
comity	The mutual recognition by nations of the laws and customs of others. <i>A show of public <b>comity</b> in the White House.</i>
condescendingly	With condescension; in a patronizing manner. <i>He treats his secretary</i> <b>condescendingly</b> .
<u>courteous</u>	Characterized by courtesy and gracious good manners. She was <b>courteous</b> and obliging to all.
<u>courtesy</u>	The showing of politeness in one's attitude and behaviour towards others. A <b>courtesy</b> car.
couth	Refined. It is more <b>couth</b> to hold your shrimp genteelly by the tail when eating.
curtsy	Make a curtsy usually done only by girls and women as a sign of respect. She bobbed a <b>curtsy</b> to him.
<u>decent</u>	Decently clothed. A <b>decent</b> wage.
decorous	In keeping with good taste and propriety; polite and restrained. <i>Charlotte gave David a decorous kiss.</i>
decorum	Etiquette. <i>He had acted with the utmost <b>decorum</b>.</i>
etiquette	Rules governing socially acceptable behavior. The rules of <b>etiquette</b> are changing.
<u>gracious</u>	(in Christian belief) showing divine grace. I am saved by God s <b>gracious</b> intervention on my behalf.
<u>honest</u>	Marked by truth. Worked at an <b>honest</b> trade.



humble	Cause to feel shame; hurt the pride of. <i>He was <b>humble</b>d by his many ordeals.</i>
humility	A humble feeling. He needs the <b>humility</b> to accept that their way may be better.
intermediate	A person at an intermediate level of knowledge or skill. Groups which <b>intermediate</b> d between the individual and the state.
merciful	(used conventionally of royalty and high nobility) gracious. William did not believe in being <b>merciful</b> to those who fought against him.
<u>mild</u>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. She looked at him in <b>mild</b> surprise.
moderate	A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. <i>Moderate</i> in his demands.
<u>modest</u>	Marked by simplicity; having a humble opinion of yourself. A <b>modest</b> flat in Fulham.
<u>polite</u>	Not rude; marked by satisfactory (or especially minimal) adherence to social usages and sufficient but not noteworthy consideration for others. <i>They thought she was wrong but were too <b>polite</b> to say so.</i>
respectful	Feeling or showing deference and respect. A <b>respectful</b> glance.
respectfully	In a respectful manner. The butler bowed <b>respectfully</b> to them both.
truthful	Conforming to truth. A <b>truthful</b> person.
unbiased	Characterized by a lack of partiality. His assessment of the benefits and drawbacks was <b>unbiased</b> .
<u>unimpressive</u>	Not capable of impressing. Her early academic record was <b>unimpressive</b> .
unpretentious	Not attempting to impress others with an appearance of greater importance, talent, or culture than is actually possessed. <i>An <b>unpretentious</b> country church.</i>
