assured	Characterized by certainty or security. <i>She paints with an assured hand.</i>
bound to happen	Confined in the bowels.
<u>certain</u>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i>Set aside a certain sum each week.</i>
<u>compulsory</u>	Involving or exercising compulsion; coercive. <i>It was compulsory to attend mass.</i>

fated	(usually followed by `to') determined by tragic fate. <i>Fated to be the scene of Kennedy's assassination.</i>
for sure	Infallible or unfailing.
ineluctable	Unable to be resisted or avoided; inescapable. <i>The ineluctable facts of history.</i>
inescapable	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>They came to the inescapable conclusion that he was responsible.</i>
inevitable	Invariably occurring or appearing. <i>The inevitable letter from the bank.</i>
inexorable	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>The doctors were inexorable and there was nothing to be done.</i>
mandatory	Required by rule. <i>Attendance is mandatory.</i>
necessary	(of a concept, statement, etc.) inevitably resulting from the nature of things, so that the contrary is impossible. <i>It is not necessary for you to be here.</i>
obligatory	So customary or fashionable as to be expected of everyone or on every occasion. <i>Use of seat belts in cars is now obligatory.</i>
out of one's hands	Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.
predestined	Established or prearranged unalterably. <i>Our predestined end.</i>
predetermined	(of an outcome or course of events) determined in advance by divine will or fate; predestined. <i>At a predetermined time.</i>
preordained	(of an outcome or course of action) decided or determined beforehand; predestined. <i>A divinely preordained plan of creation.</i>
prescribed	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>In prescribed order.</i>
required	Required by rule. <i>The corset the garment that ensured the required female shape.</i>
sure	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Be sure to lock the doors.</i>
sure to happen	Exercising or taking care great enough to bring assurance.
unpreventable	Not preventable. <i>Until now this devastating disease has been unpreventable.</i>

<u>inevitably</u>	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. <i>Inevitably some details are already out of date.</i>
<u>insurmountable</u>	Not capable of being surmounted or overcome. <i>Insurmountable disadvantages.</i>
<u>integral</u>	The result of a mathematical integration $F(x)$ is the integral of $f(x)$ if $dF = f(x) dx$. <i>A local motion keeps bodies integral.</i>
meaningful	Serious, important, or worthwhile. <i>Meaningful glances and repressed passion.</i>
<u>must</u>	A necessary or essential thing. <i>If you must smoke you could at least go in the living room.</i>

<u>necessarily</u>	As a necessary result; inevitably. <i>The prognosis can necessarily be only an educated guess.</i>
necessary	Needed to be done, achieved, or present; essential. <i>A bag containing my wallet the money the necessary.</i>
necessity	The state or fact of being required. <i>The necessity of providing parental guidance.</i>
need	Have need of. <i>She satisfied his need for affection.</i>
needs	Of necessity. <i>We must needs by objective.</i>
obligate	Restricted to a particular condition of life. <i>The medical establishment is obligated to take action in the best interest of the public.</i>
<u>obligated</u>	Caused by law or conscience to follow a certain course. <i>Felt obligated to repay the kindness.</i>
obligatory	Morally or legally constraining or binding. <i>Use of seat belts in cars is now obligatory.</i>
perforce	By necessity; by force of circumstance. <i>Amateurs perforce have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<u>prerequisite</u>	Something that is required in advance. <i>Latin was a prerequisite for admission.</i>
require	Require as useful just or proper. <i>Please indicate how many tickets you require.</i>
required	Required by rule. <i>Required reading.</i>
requisite	Made necessary by particular circumstances or regulations. <i>A place where the requisites of water fuel and fodder can be obtained.</i>
<u>unconditional</u>	Not modified or restricted by reservations. <i>Unconditional surrender.</i>
<u>underlying</u>	Significant as a cause or basis of something but not necessarily manifest or obvious. <i>An underlying meaning.</i>
<u>vital</u>	The body's important internal organs. <i>The wound is vital.</i>
