<b>assured</b>	Characterized by certainty or security. <i>She paints with an <b>assured</b> hand.</i>
<b>bound to happen</b>	Confined in the bowels.
<b><u>certain</u></b>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable Benjamin Franklin. <i>Set aside a <b>certain</b> sum each week.</i>
<b><u>compulsory</u></b>	Involving or exercising compulsion; coercive. <i>It was <b>compulsory</b> to attend mass.</i>

<b>fated</b>	(usually followed by `to') determined by tragic fate. <i><b>Fated</b> to be the scene of Kennedy's assassination.</i>
<b>for sure</b>	Infallible or unflinching.
<b>ineluctable</b>	Unable to be resisted or avoided; inescapable. <i>The <b>ineluctable</b> facts of history.</i>
<b>inescapable</b>	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>They came to the <b>inescapable</b> conclusion that he was responsible.</i>
<b>inevitable</b>	Invariably occurring or appearing. <i>The <b>inevitable</b> letter from the bank.</i>
<b>inexorable</b>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>The doctors were <b>inexorable</b> and there was nothing to be done.</i>
<b>mandatory</b>	Required by rule. <i>Attendance is <b>mandatory</b>.</i>
<b>necessary</b>	(of a concept, statement, etc.) inevitably resulting from the nature of things, so that the contrary is impossible. <i>It is not <b>necessary</b> for you to be here.</i>
<b>obligatory</b>	So customary or fashionable as to be expected of everyone or on every occasion. <i>Use of seat belts in cars is now <b>obligatory</b>.</i>
<b>out of one's hands</b>	Knocked unconscious by a heavy blow.
<b>predestined</b>	Established or prearranged unalterably. <i>Our <b>predestined</b> end.</i>
<b>predetermined</b>	(of an outcome or course of events) determined in advance by divine will or fate; predestined. <i>At a <b>predetermined</b> time.</i>
<b>preordained</b>	(of an outcome or course of action) decided or determined beforehand; predestined. <i>A divinely <b>preordained</b> plan of creation.</i>
<b>prescribed</b>	Fixed or established especially by order or command. <i>In <b>prescribed</b> order.</i>
<b>required</b>	Required by rule. <i>The corset the garment that ensured the <b>required</b> female shape.</i>
<b>sure</b>	Having or feeling no doubt or uncertainty confident and assured. <i>Be <b>sure</b> to lock the doors.</i>
<b>sure to happen</b>	Exercising or taking care great enough to bring assurance.
<b>unpreventable</b>	Not preventable. <i>Until now this devastating disease has been <b>unpreventable</b>.</i>

<b>accountability</b>	Responsibility to someone or for some activity. <i>Lack of <b>accountability</b> has corroded public respect for business and political leaders.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Be present at the same place and at the same time. <i>The two events <b>coincided</b>.</i>
<b>essential</b>	Being or relating to or containing the essence of a plant etc. <i>It is <b>essential</b> to keep up to date records.</i>
<b>impel</b>	Drive, force, or urge (someone) to do something. <i>A lack of equality <b>impelled</b> the oppressed to fight.</i>
<b>important</b>	Important in effect or meaning. <i>Recited the decree with an <b>important</b> air.</i>

<b><u>inevitably</u></b>	In such a manner as could not be otherwise. <i><b>Inevitably</b> some details are already out of date.</i>
<b><u>insurmountable</u></b>	Not capable of being surmounted or overcome. <i><b>Insurmountable</b> disadvantages.</i>
<b><u>integral</u></b>	The result of a mathematical integration $F(x)$ is the integral of $f(x)$ if $dF = f(x) dx$ . <i>A local motion keeps bodies <b>integral</b>.</i>
<b>meaningful</b>	Serious, important, or worthwhile. <i><b>Meaningful</b> glances and repressed passion.</i>
<b><u>must</u></b>	A necessary or essential thing. <i>If you <b>must</b> smoke you could at least go in the living room.</i>

<b><u>necessarily</u></b>	As a necessary result; inevitably. <i>The prognosis can <b>necessarily</b> be only an educated guess.</i>
<b>necessary</b>	Needed to be done, achieved, or present; essential. <i>A bag containing my wallet the money the <b>necessary</b>.</i>
<b>necessity</b>	The state or fact of being required. <i>The <b>necessity</b> of providing parental guidance.</i>
<b>need</b>	Have need of. <i>She satisfied his <b>need</b> for affection.</i>
<b>needs</b>	Of necessity. <i>We must <b>needs</b> by objective.</i>
<b>obligate</b>	Restricted to a particular condition of life. <i>The medical establishment is <b>obligated</b> to take action in the best interest of the public.</i>
<b><u>obligated</u></b>	Caused by law or conscience to follow a certain course. <i>Felt <b>obligated</b> to repay the kindness.</i>
<b>obligatory</b>	Morally or legally constraining or binding. <i>Use of seat belts in cars is now <b>obligatory</b>.</i>
<b>perforce</b>	By necessity; by force of circumstance. <i>Amateurs <b>perforce</b> have to settle for less expensive solutions.</i>
<b><u>prerequisite</u></b>	Something that is required in advance. <i>Latin was a <b>prerequisite</b> for admission.</i>
<b>require</b>	Require as useful just or proper. <i>Please indicate how many tickets you <b>require</b>.</i>
<b>required</b>	Required by rule. <i><b>Required</b> reading.</i>
<b>requisite</b>	Made necessary by particular circumstances or regulations. <i>A place where the <b>requisites</b> of water fuel and fodder can be obtained.</i>
<b><u>unconditional</u></b>	Not modified or restricted by reservations. <i><b>Unconditional</b> surrender.</i>
<b><u>underlying</u></b>	Significant as a cause or basis of something but not necessarily manifest or obvious. <i>An <b>underlying</b> meaning.</i>
<b><u>vital</u></b>	The body's important internal organs. <i>The wound is <b>vital</b>.</i>
