### Definitions of "Unbearable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unbearable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Incapable of being tolerated or endured.*
- *Not able to be endured or tolerated.*
- *Incapable of being put up with.*

### Synonyms of "Unbearable" as an adjective (11 Words)

#### **impossible**

Totally unlikely.

*It was almost **impossible** to keep up with him.*

#### **insufferable**

Unbearably arrogant or conceited.

*The heat would be **insufferable** by July.*

#### **insupportable**

Unable to be endured; intolerable.

*He had arrived at a wholly **insupportable** conclusion.*

#### **intolerable**

Incapable of being put up with.

*An **intolerable** degree of sentimentality.*

<b>more than flesh and blood can stand</b>	Quantifier meaning greater in number.
<b>overpowering</b>	Extremely strong or intense; overwhelming. <i>An <b>overpowering</b> need for solitude.</i>
<b>past bearing</b>	Of a person who has held and relinquished a position or office.
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not acceptable; not welcome. <i><b>Unacceptable</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>unendurable</b>	Not able to be tolerated or endured. <i>Cries of <b>unendurable</b> suffering.</i>
<b>unmanageable</b>	Difficult or impossible to manage, manipulate, or control. <i>His behaviour was becoming <b>unmanageable</b> at home.</i>
<b>unsupportable</b>	Not able to be supported or defended.

## Usage Examples of "Unbearable" as an adjective

- *The heat was getting unbearable.*

## Associations of "Unbearable" (30 Words)

<b>abstinent</b>	A person who refrains from drinking intoxicating beverages. <i>Not totally <b>abstinent</b> but abstemious.</i>
<b>banned</b>	Forbidden by law.
<b>crazy</b>	(of an angle) appearing absurdly out of place or unlikely. <i>A football <b>crazy</b> bunch of boys.</i>
<b>discontented</b>	Showing or experiencing dissatisfaction or restless longing. <i>Was <b>discontented</b> with his position.</i>
<b>discouraged</b>	Made less hopeful or enthusiastic. <i>The accident left others <b>discouraged</b> about going there.</i>
<b>disgruntled</b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from <b>disgruntled</b> members of the public.</i>
<b>dissatisfied</b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i><b>Dissatisfied</b> customers.</i>
<b>forbidden</b>	Denoting or involving a transition between two quantum-mechanical states that does not conform to some selection rule, especially for electric dipole radiation. <i>A list of <b>forbidden</b> books.</i>

<b>impermissible</b>	Not permitted. <i>Their refusal to discuss the issue is <b>impermissible</b>.</i>
<b>impossible</b>	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>An <b>impossible</b> situation.</i>
<b>inadequate</b>	Lacking the quality or quantity required; insufficient for a purpose. <i>The staff was <b>inadequate</b>.</i>
<b>inadmissible</b>	Not deserving to be admitted. <i>He held that such evidence was <b>inadmissible</b>.</i>
<b>insufferable</b>	Too extreme to bear. <i><b>Insufferable</b> insolence.</i>
<b>intolerable</b>	Incapable of being tolerated or endured. <i>The <b>intolerable</b> pressures of his work.</i>
<b>objectionable</b>	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>A vulgar and <b>objectionable</b> person.</i>
<b>outrageous</b>	Wildly exaggerated or improbable. <i>The <b>outrageous</b> claims made by the previous government.</i>
<b>pessimistic</b>	Expecting the worst possible outcome. <i>He was <b>pessimistic</b> about the prospects.</i>
<b>prohibit</b>	Formally forbid someone from doing something. <i>The budget agreement had <b>prohibited</b> any tax cuts.</i>
<b>prohibition</b>	The period from 1920 to 1933 when the sale of alcoholic beverages was prohibited in the United States by a constitutional amendment. <i>They were restrained by a <b>prohibition</b> in their charter.</i>
<b>prohibitionist</b>	A reformer who opposes the use of intoxicating beverages.
<b>prohibitory</b>	Tending to discourage (especially of prices).
<b>ridiculously</b>	So as to arouse or deserve laughter. <i><b>Ridiculously</b> I felt like crying.</i>
<b>taboo</b>	Place under a taboo. <i>The burial ground was seen as a <b>taboo</b> place.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was <b>unacceptable</b>.</i>
<b>unendurable</b>	Incapable of being put up with. <i>Cries of <b>unendurable</b> suffering.</i>
<b>unimaginable</b>	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. <i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>
<b>unpalatable</b>	Difficult to put up with or accept. <i><b>Unpalatable</b> truths.</i>

unsavory Not pleasing in odor or taste.  
*An **unsavory** scandal.*

**unsupportable** Not able to be supported or defended.

unthinkable Incapable of being conceived or considered.  
*The **unthinkable** happened I spoke up.*
