<b>peerless</b>	Unequaled; unrivalled. <i>A <b>peerless</b> cartoonist.</i>
<b><u>unassailable</u></b>	Unable to be attacked, questioned, or defeated. <i>An <b>unassailable</b> lead.</i>
<b>unconquerable</b>	(especially of a place, people, or emotion) not conquerable. <i>Faced <b>unconquerable</b> difficulties.</i>
<b><u>unmatched</u></b>	Not matched or equalled. <i>Infamy <b>unmatched</b> in the Western world.</i>
<b><u>unstoppable</u></b>	Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>As <b>unstoppable</b> as the wind.</i>
<b>unsurpassable</b>	Not able to be exceeded in quality or degree. <i><b>Unsurpassable</b> skill.</i>
<b><u>unsurpassed</u></b>	Better or greater than any other. <i>The quality of workmanship is <b>unsurpassed</b>.</i>
<b>unvanquishable</b>	Incapable of being overcome or subdued.

<b><u>aftermath</u></b>	New grass growing after mowing or harvest. <i>The <b>aftermath</b> of war.</i>
<b>aggressiveness</b>	Determination and forcefulness. <i>Recent research has linked violent video games to increased <b>aggressiveness</b> in youths.</i>
<b><u>battle</u></b>	Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle. <i>Grant won a decisive victory in the <b>battle</b> of Chickamauga.</i>
<b>battlefield</b>	A region where a battle is being (or has been) fought. <i>The <b>battlefields</b> of the Great War.</i>
<b>belligerence</b>	Aggressive or warlike behaviour. <i>A blatant act of <b>belligerence</b>.</i>
<b>bombardier</b>	A noncommissioned officer in the British artillery.

<b>byzantine</b>	Highly complex or intricate and occasionally devious.
<b>combat</b>	Engage in a fight with; oppose in battle. <i>Pilots re enacted the aerial <b>combats</b> of yesteryear.</i>
<b>conflict</b>	Be in conflict. <i>The date for the match <b>conflicted</b> with a religious festival.</i>
<b>crossfire</b>	Fire from two or more points so that the lines of fire cross. <i>A photographer was killed in <b>crossfire</b>.</i>
<b>defensive</b>	An attitude of defensiveness especially in the phrase on the defensive. <i><b>Defensive</b> weapons.</i>
<b>fighting</b>	The action of fighting violence or conflict. <i>He was a <b>fighting</b> man.</i>
<b>foe</b>	A personal enemy. <i>They had been political <b>foes</b> for years.</i>
<b>grenade</b>	A small explosive bomb thrown by hand or fired from a missile.
<b>hostile</b>	Opposed. <i>The platoon ran into a pack of <b>hostiles</b>.</i>
<b>impregnable</b>	Unable to be defeated or overcome. <i><b>Impregnable</b> self confidence.</i>
<b>invincible</b>	Incapable of being overcome or subdued. <i>An <b>invincible</b> army.</i>
<b>mighty</b>	(of an action) performed with or requiring great strength. <i>The <b>mighty</b> logger Paul Bunyan.</i>
<b>ploy</b>	A maneuver in a game or conversation. <i>The president has dismissed the referendum as a <b>ploy</b> to buy time.</i>
<b>postwar</b>	Belonging to the period after a war.
<b>stouthearted</b>	Used especially of persons. <i>A <b>stouthearted</b> fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
<b>strategically</b>	With regard to strategy. <i>Violence was deployed <b>strategically</b>.</i>
<b>strategy</b>	The branch of military science dealing with military command and the planning and conduct of a war. <i>Time to develop a coherent economic <b>strategy</b>.</i>
<b>tactic</b>	A plan for attaining a particular goal. <i>These are possible tax saving <b>tactics</b> to discuss with your accountant.</i>
<b>tactical</b>	Relating to or constituting actions carefully planned to gain a specific military end. <i>NATO already has about 7 000 <b>tactical</b> nuclear weapons in Europe.</i>

<b>tactics</b>	A plan for attaining a particular goal.
<u><a href="#">war</a></u>	A legal state created by a declaration of war and ended by official declaration during which the international rules of war apply. <i>The two countries were at <b>war</b> for the next eight years.</i>
<u><a href="#">warfare</a></u>	The waging of armed conflict against an enemy. <i>Diplomatic <b>warfare</b>.</i>
<b>warmonger</b>	A person who advocates war or warlike policies.
<u><a href="#">warrior</a></u>	(especially in former times) a brave or experienced soldier or fighter. <i>The <b>warrior</b> heroes of ancient Greece.</i>
