Synonyms of "Uncaring" as an adjective (41 Words)

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| blasé | Uninterested because of frequent exposure or indulgence. |
| calm | (of a place) peaceful after violent activity. <i>She had to keep calm at all costs.</i> |
| <u>careless</u> | Not giving sufficient attention or thought to avoiding harm or errors. <i>Careless about her clothes.</i> |
| <u>casual</u> | Without formality of style or manner, in particular (of clothing) suitable for everyday wear rather than formal occasions. <i>A difficult feat performed with casual mastery.</i> |
| collected | (of a horse) moving with a shortened stride and with its hind legs correctly placed to achieve balance and impulsion. <i>Many top riders that instinctively ride a horse collected cannot explain the theory.</i> |
| composed | Serenely self-possessed and free from agitation especially in times of stress. <i>A very talented and composed young player.</i> |

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| cool | Psychologically cool and unenthusiastic unfriendly or unresponsive or showing dislike. <i>Keep cool.</i> |
| cool, calm, and collected | Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. |
| detached | No longer connected or joined. <i>A detached garage.</i> |
| emotionless | Unmoved by feeling-Margaret Deland. <i>Her voice was flat and emotionless.</i> |
| equable | Not varying. <i>He could look sterner than his equable temperament would suggest.</i> |
| half-hearted | Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm. |
| impassive | Deliberately impassive in manner. <i>He remained impassive showing neither interest in nor concern for our plight.</i> |
| indifferent | Having no particular interest or sympathy; unconcerned. <i>A properly indifferent jury.</i> |
| insouciant | Showing a casual lack of concern. <i>An insouciant shrug.</i> |
| <u>lax</u> | Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles relaxed. <i>The merger of tense and lax vowels before l.</i> |
| <u>lazy</u> | (of a river) slow-moving. <i>Up a lazy river.</i> |
| <u>leisurely</u> | Acting or done at leisure; unhurried or relaxed. <i>At a leisurely or easygoing pace.</i> |
| level-headed | Exercising or showing good judgment. |
| lukewarm | Showing little enthusiasm. <i>Gave only lukewarm support to the candidate.</i> |
| <u>nonchalant</u> | (of a person or manner) feeling or appearing casually calm and relaxed; not displaying anxiety, interest, or enthusiasm. <i>Drove his car with nonchalant abandon.</i> |
| offhand | Casually thoughtless or inconsiderate. <i>You were a bit offhand with her this afternoon.</i> |
| <u>placid</u> | Not easily upset or excited. <i>A ribbon of sand between the angry sea and the placid bay.</i> |

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| relaxed | (of a muscle or other body part) not tense. <i>A relaxed and informal discussion.</i> |
| self-possessed | In full control of your faculties. |
| <u>serene</u> | Calm, peaceful, and untroubled; tranquil. <i>A serene expression on her face.</i> |
| <u>sober</u> | Not affected by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>As sober as a judge.</i> |
| temperate | Not extreme. <i>Temperate in his response to criticism.</i> |
| <u>thoughtless</u> | (of a person or their behaviour) not showing consideration for the needs of other people. <i>The debate turned into thoughtless bickering.</i> |
| <u>tranquil</u> | Not agitated; without losing self-possession. <i>A lake of tranquil blue water reflecting a tranquil blue sky.</i> |
| unaffectionate | Feeling, showing, or having no fondness or tenderness. <i>His background was deeply unaffectionate.</i> |
| <u>unconcerned</u> | Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>Scott seemed unconcerned by his companion's problem.</i> |
| <u>unemotional</u> | Not having or showing strong feelings. <i>A flat unemotional voice.</i> |
| <u>unenthusiastic</u> | Not having or showing enthusiasm. <i>An unenthusiastic response.</i> |
| unexcitable | Not easily excited. <i>An unexcitable temperament.</i> |
| unflappable | Having or showing calmness in a crisis. <i>Self contained unflappable Glaswegian common sense.</i> |
| uninterested | Not having or showing interest. <i>I was totally uninterested in boys.</i> |
| unperturbed | Not perturbed or concerned. <i>Kenneth seems unperturbed by the news.</i> |
| unruffled | Not disordered or disarranged. <i>With contented mind and unruffled spirit.</i> |
| unsentimental | Facing facts or difficulties realistically and with determination. <i>The speeches were short and unsentimental.</i> |
| unthinking | Mentally sluggish. <i>She was at pains to correct unthinking prejudices.</i> |
