Synonyms of "Uncertainties" as a noun (7 Words)

doubt	A feeling of uncertainty or lack of conviction. <i>Some doubt has been cast upon the authenticity of this account.</i>
doubtfulness	The state of being unsure of something.
dubiety	The state or quality of being doubtful; uncertainty. <i>His enemies made much of the dubiety of his paternity.</i>
dubiousness	The state of being unsure of something. <i>The dubiousness of his claim.</i>
incertitude	The state of being unsure of something. <i>Some schools broke down under the stresses of policy incertitude.</i>
precariousness	The state of being uncertain or dependent on chance. <i>The precariousness of his income.</i>
uncertainness	Being unsettled or in doubt or dependent on chance.



Usage Examples of "Uncertainties" as a noun

- *The uncertainty of the outcome.*



Associations of "Uncertainties" (30 Words)

agnostic	Relating to agnostics or agnosticism. <i>Many common file formats JPEG MP3 etc are platform agnostic.</i>
<u>ambiguity</u>	Unclearness by virtue of having more than one meaning. <i>We can detect no ambiguity in this section of the Act.</i>
ambiguous	Not clear or decided. <i>Ambiguous words.</i>
ambiguously	In an ambiguous manner. <i>The new clause is ambiguously worded.</i>
<u>ambivalent</u>	Uncertain or unable to decide about what course to follow. <i>Some loved her some hated her few were ambivalent about her.</i>
<u>caprice</u>	A sudden and unaccountable change of mood or behaviour. <i>A land where men were ruled by law and not by caprice.</i>
<u>doubt</u>	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>They had doubts that they would ever win.</i>

doubtful	Feeling uncertain about something. <i>It was doubtful whether she would be admitted.</i>
dubious	Not convinced. <i>They admitted the force of my argument but remained dubious.</i>
equivocal	Open to more than one interpretation; ambiguous. <i>Aliens of equivocal loyalty.</i>
imprecise	Lacking exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. <i>The witness could give only vague and imprecise descriptions.</i>
imprecision	Lack of exactness or accuracy. <i>All scientific measurements come with some degree of imprecision.</i>
inconclusive	Not leading to a firm conclusion or result; not ending doubt or dispute. <i>The inconclusive committee vote.</i>
incredulity	The state of being unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>He stared down the street in incredulity.</i>
incredulous	(of a person or their manner) unwilling or unable to believe something. <i>An incredulous gasp.</i>
indeterminate	Not exactly known, established, or defined. <i>An indeterminate future.</i>
inexact	Not exact. <i>An inexact description.</i>
shady	Unscrupulous. <i>They sprawled under a shady carob tree.</i>
skeptic	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
skeptical	Marked by or given to doubt. <i>A skeptical listener.</i>
skepticism	The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge.
suspicious	Having the belief or impression that someone is involved in an illegal or dishonest activity. <i>Police were called when staff became suspicious.</i>
suspiciously	With suspicion. <i>The group was suspiciously quiet about their activities.</i>
uncertain	Not able to be relied on; not known or definite. <i>Everything is uncertain about the army.</i>
unclear	Having or feeling doubt or confusion. <i>Their future remains unclear.</i>
undecided	Characterized by indecision. <i>Our position on this bill is still undecided.</i>

- vagary** An unexpected and inexplicable change in something (in a situation or a person's behavior, etc).
The vagaries of the weather.
- vague** Lacking clarity or distinctness.
*Many patients suffer **vague** symptoms.*
- vaguely** In a way that is uncertain, indefinite or unclear; roughly.
*He **vaguely** remembered talking to her once.*
- whim** An odd or fanciful or capricious idea.
*She bought it on a **whim**.*
