indestructible	Not easily destroyed. <i>Indestructible plastic containers.</i>
ineradicable	Unable to be destroyed or removed. <i>Ineradicable superstitions.</i>
invariable	Never changing. <i>An invariable temperature.</i>
invariant	Unvarying in nature. <i>The pattern of cell divisions was found to be invariant.</i>
<u>irreversible</u>	Not able to be undone or altered. <i>Irreversible momentum toward revolution.</i>
<u>lasting</u>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A lasting happy marriage.</i>
<u>lifelong</u>	Continuing through life. <i>A lifelong friend.</i>
<u>permanent</u>	Lasting or intended to last or remain unchanged indefinitely. <i>Damage was not thought to be permanent.</i>

perpetual	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>A perpetual bond.</i>
set	Set down according to a plan. <i>We are set to go at any time.</i>
set in stone	Fixed and unmoving- Connor Cruise O'Brien.
unalterable	Not able to be changed. <i>An unalterable truth.</i>
unfading	Of an imaginary flower that never fades. <i>Then with smile unfading he handed the envelope to Lewis.</i>
unvarying	Unvarying in nature. <i>Principles of unvarying validity.</i>

incessant	Uninterrupted in time and indefinitely long continuing. <i>Night and day we live with the incessant noise of the city.</i>
incessantly	Without interruption. <i>She talked about him incessantly.</i>
indelible	Cannot be removed or erased. <i>An indelible stain.</i>
indestructible	Not easily destroyed. <i>Indestructible plastic containers.</i>

<u>irrevocably</u>	In an irrevocable manner. <i>Our environment will be irrevocably damaged.</i>
<u>lasting</u>	Lasting a long time without change. <i>A lasting happy marriage.</i>
permanence	The state or quality of lasting or remaining unchanged indefinitely. <i>The clarity and permanence of the dyes.</i>
permanency	The property of being able to exist for an indefinite duration.
<u>permanent</u>	A series of waves in the hair made by applying heat and chemicals. <i>Permanent address.</i>

perpetual	Continuing forever or indefinitely. <i>Deep caves in perpetual darkness.</i>
<u>stable</u>	Shelter in a stable. <i>Specially designed dinghies that are very stable.</i>
steadfast	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>Steadfast loyalty.</i>
