<u>barbarian</u>	Relating to ancient barbarians. Barbarian invaders.
barbaric	Savagely cruel. <i>Barbaric</i> practices.
benighted	Overtaken by night or darkness. They saw themselves as bringers of culture to poor benighted peoples.
boorish	Ill-mannered and coarse and contemptible in behavior or appearance. Was boorish and insensitive.
coarse	Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish. A man of coarse speech.
ill-bred	Lacking in refinement or grace.
ill-mannered	Socially incorrect in behavior.



loutish	Uncouth and aggressive. The loutish manners of a bully.
philistine	Hostile or indifferent to culture and the arts. There were displays to inspire even the most philistine of visitors.
rough	Difficult and unpleasant or unfair. A few rough sketches.
savage	Without civilizing influences-Margaret Meade. A savage race.
thuggish	Characterized by violent behaviour, especially of a criminal nature. <i>They have been accused of thuggish tactics</i> .
uncivilised	Without civilizing influences-Margaret Meade.
uncouth	(of a place) wild, remote, or spartan. <i>He is unwashed uncouth and drunk most of the time.</i>
uncultivated	Characteristic of a person who is not cultivated or does not have intellectual tastes. An ignorant and uncultivated soldier.
<u>uncultured</u>	Lacking art or knowledge. To my uncultured palate most of the wines were good.
uneducated	Having or showing a poor level of education. Women from uneducated backgrounds.
unpolished	Lacking social polish. His shoes were unpolished .
<u>unrefined</u>	Not refined or processed. <i>Unrefined</i> sugar.
unsophisticated	Not wise in the ways of the world- Kate O'Brien. Unsophisticated computer software.
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. A godforsaken wild erness crossroads.

Usage Examples of "Uncivilized" as an adjective

- Forgive me for my apparent rudeness, it was most uncivilized of me.
- They pitied us for leaving the Smoke for such uncivilized remoteness.
- Fighting is crude and uncivilized especially if the weapons are efficient.
- Children are basically uncivilized.

barbarous	Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. Avoiding barbarous sentences or ambiguities.
brutal	Resembling a beast; showing lack of human sensibility. The brutal morning light.
brutish	Resembling or characteristic of a brute. <i>Brutish</i> behaviour.
cruel	Causing pain or suffering. Ernie nearly cruel led the whole thing by laughing.
<u>fell</u>	The act of felling something as a tree.
<u>ferocious</u>	Very great; extreme. A ferocious beating.
fiendish	Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i>Fiendish</i> methods of torture.
harsh	(of a climate or conditions) difficult to survive in; hostile. Drenched in a harsh white neon light.
<u>heinous</u>	Extremely wicked, deeply criminal. A battery of heinous crimes.
inhuman	Lacking human qualities of compassion and mercy; cruel and barbaric. <i>The inhuman scale of the dinosaurs.</i>
inhumane	Lacking and reflecting lack of pity or compassion. Biological weapons are considered too inhumane to be used.
intractable	(of a person) difficult or stubborn. Intractable metal.
<u>militant</u>	A militant person. Militant in fighting for better wages for workers.
pitiless	Deficient in humane and kindly feelings. A pitiless executioner.



<u>primitive</u>	A painting by a primitive artist or an object in a primitive style. <i>Primitive</i> movies of the 1890s.
<u>repression</u>	The restraint, prevention, or inhibition of a feeling, quality, etc. <i>Children and adults pay a heavy price for their deep</i> repression <i>of thoughts about death.</i>
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>He is a rude and arrogant bully.</i>
sadistic	Deriving pleasure from inflicting pain, suffering, or humiliation on others. She took a sadistic pleasure in tormenting him.
savage	A representation of a bearded and semi-naked man with a wreath of leaves. Police are rounding up dogs after a girl was savage d.
truculence	Obstreperous and defiant aggressiveness.
<u>truculent</u>	Eager or quick to argue or fight; aggressively defiant. The truculent attitude of farmers to cheaper imports.
untamed	In a natural state; not tamed or domesticated or cultivated. <i>Her hair was a tumble of untamed curls.</i>
vicious	Bringing or deserving severe rebuke or censure. A vicious flu bug.
<u>warlike</u>	(of plans, preparations, or munitions) directed towards or prepared for war. <i>Warlike</i> preparations could be made quickly.
wild	A wild and uninhabited area left in its natural condition. <i>Wild parties.</i>
