<a href="#">determined</a>	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>Helen was a <b>determined</b> little girl.</i>
<a href="#">dogged</a>	Stubbornly unyielding- T.S.Eliot. <i>Success required <b>dogged</b> determination.</i>

<b>firm</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>The post was still <b>firm</b> after being hit by the car.</i>
<b>hard and fast</b>	; produced with the back of the tongue raised toward or touching the velum.
<b>hard-line</b>	Firm and uncompromising.
<b>headstrong</b>	Energetically wilful and determined. <i>The <b>headstrong</b> impulsiveness of youth.</i>
<b><u>immovable</u></b>	Not able or intended to be moved. <i>The <b>immovable</b> hills.</i>
<b>implacable</b>	Unable to be stopped; relentless. <i>An <b>implacable</b> enemy.</i>
<b>inexorable</b>	(of a person) impossible to persuade; unrelenting. <i>Cynthia was <b>inexorable</b> she would have none of him.</i>
<b>inflexible</b>	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i><b>Inflexible</b> rules.</i>
<b>intractable</b>	Not tractable; difficult to manage or mold. <i><b>Intractable</b> metal.</i>
<b>intransigent</b>	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason. <i>An <b>intransigent</b> conservative opposed to every liberal tendency.</i>
<b>obdurate</b>	Stubbornly refusing to change one's opinion or course of action. <i>I argued this point with him but he was <b>obdurate</b>.</i>
<b>obstinate</b>	Tenaciously unwilling or marked by tenacious unwillingness to yield. <i>The <b>obstinate</b> problem of unemployment.</i>
<b>pertinacious</b>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>He worked with a <b>pertinacious</b> resistance to interruptions.</i>
<b><u>relentless</u></b>	Harsh or inflexible. <i>The <b>relentless</b> heat of the desert.</i>
<b><u>resolute</u></b>	Admirably purposeful, determined, and unwavering. <i>He was <b>resolute</b> in his fight to uphold liberal values.</i>
<b>rigid</b>	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>Beatrice was <b>rigid</b> with terror.</i>
<b>single-minded</b>	Determined.
<b><u>stiff</u></b>	Powerful. <i>The shower tap is a little <b>stiff</b>.</i>
<b>stiff-necked</b>	Haughtily stubborn.
<b>stubborn</b>	Not responding to treatment. <i>A <b>stubborn</b> refusal to learn from experience.</i>

<b>sturdy</b>	(of a person or their body) strongly and solidly built. <i>Sturdy</i> canvas.
<b>tenacious</b>	Tending to keep a firm hold of something; clinging or adhering closely. <i>Tenacious</i> memory.
<b>tough</b>	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>Police have been getting tough</i> with drivers.
<b>unbending</b>	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. An <i>unbending</i> will to dominate.
<b>unmalleable</b>	Not malleable; inflexible, unbending, unadaptable.
<b>unpersuadable</b>	Not susceptible to persuasion. <i>He is absolutely unpersuadable</i> on the subject of travel.
<b>unshakeable</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. My <i>unshakeable</i> faith in the goodness of mankind.
<b>unwavering</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering</i> stare.
<b>unyielding</b>	Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot. His <i>unyielding</i> faith.

<b>determined</b>	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>Made continued and determined</i> efforts to find and destroy enemy headquarters.
<b>dour</b>	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>The proverbially dour</i> New England Puritan.

<b>firm</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>Holds a <b>firm</b> position as the country's leading poet.</i>
<b>hard</b>	Unfortunate or hard to bear. <i>The <b>hard</b> left.</i>
<b>hidebound</b>	Unwilling or unable to change because of tradition or convention. <i>They are working to change <b>hidebound</b> corporate cultures.</i>
<b>inflexible</b>	Not making concessions. <i>Heavy <b>inflexible</b> armour.</i>
<b>intransigence</b>	The trait of being intransigent; stubbornly refusing to compromise. <i>In the face of government <b>intransigence</b> he resigned in disgust.</i>
<b>intransigent</b>	An intransigent person. <i>Her father had tried persuasion but she was <b>intransigent</b>.</i>
<b>monotheism</b>	The doctrine or belief that there is only one God.
<b>obduracy</b>	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
<b>obdurate</b>	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>I argued this point with him but he was <b>obdurate</b>.</i>
<b>obstinate</b>	Tenaciously unwilling or marked by tenacious unwillingness to yield. <i>The <b>obstinate</b> problem of unemployment.</i>
<b>pertinacious</b>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>The most vocal and <b>pertinacious</b> of all the critics.</i>
<b>principled</b>	(of a system or method) based on a given set of rules. <i>A coherent and <b>principled</b> approach.</i>
<b>resolute</b>	Firm in purpose or belief; characterized by firmness and determination. <i>Stood <b>resolute</b> against the enemy.</i>
<b>resolved</b>	Firmly determined to do something. <i>Mysteries solved and unsolved problems <b>resolved</b> and <b>unresolved</b>.</i>
<b>rigid</b>	A lorry which is not articulated. <i>A <b>rigid</b> strip of metal.</i>
<b>rigidness</b>	The physical property of being stiff and resisting bending.
<b>rigour</b>	Severity or strictness. <i>His analysis is lacking in <b>rigour</b>.</i>
<b>severity</b>	Used of the degree of something undesirable e.g. pain or weather. <i>Sentences should reflect the <b>severity</b> of the crime.</i>
<b>stern</b>	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. <i>The past year has been a <b>stern</b> test of the ability of British industry.</i>
<b>stiff</b>	In a stiff manner. <i>A long <b>stiff</b> climb up the bare hillside.</i>

<b>strictly</b>	With no exceptions; completely or absolutely. <i><b>Strictly</b> speaking ham is a cured cooked leg of pork.</i>
<b>stubborn</b>	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. <i>A <b>stubborn</b> infection.</i>
<b>tenacious</b>	Persisting in existence; not easily dispelled. <i><b>Tenacious</b> memory.</i>
<b>tough</b>	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i><b>Tough</b> rucksacks for climbers.</i>
<b>unbending</b>	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>An <b>unbending</b> will to dominate.</i>
<b>unwavering</b>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i><b>Unwavering</b> loyalty.</i>
<b>unyielding</b>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>An <b>unyielding</b> head support.</i>
