dogged	Stubbornly unyielding- T.S.Eliot. <i>Success required dogged determination.</i>

firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>The post was still firm after being hit by the car.</i>
hard and fast	; produced with the back of the tongue raised toward or touching the velum.
hard-line	Firm and uncompromising.
headstrong	Energetically wilful and determined. <i>The headstrong impulsiveness of youth.</i>
<u>immovable</u>	Not able or intended to be moved. <i>The immovable hills.</i>
implacable	Unable to be stopped; relentless. <i>An implacable enemy.</i>
inexorable	(of a person) impossible to persuade; unrelenting. <i>Cynthia was inexorable she would have none of him.</i>
inflexible	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>Inflexible rules.</i>
intractable	Not tractable; difficult to manage or mold. <i>Intractable metal.</i>
intransigent	Impervious to pleas, persuasion, requests, reason. <i>An intransigent conservative opposed to every liberal tendency.</i>
obdurate	Stubbornly refusing to change one's opinion or course of action. <i>I argued this point with him but he was obdurate.</i>
obstinate	Tenaciously unwilling or marked by tenacious unwillingness to yield. <i>The obstinate problem of unemployment.</i>
pertinacious	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>He worked with a pertinacious resistance to interruptions.</i>
<u>relentless</u>	Harsh or inflexible. <i>The relentless heat of the desert.</i>
<u>resolute</u>	Admirably purposeful, determined, and unwavering. <i>He was resolute in his fight to uphold liberal values.</i>
rigid	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>Beatrice was rigid with terror.</i>
single-minded	Determined.
<u>stiff</u>	Powerful. <i>The shower tap is a little stiff.</i>
stiff-necked	Haughtily stubborn.
stubborn	Not responding to treatment. <i>A stubborn refusal to learn from experience.</i>

<u>sturdy</u>	(of a person or their body) strongly and solidly built. <i>Sturdy canvas.</i>
tenacious	Tending to keep a firm hold of something; clinging or adhering closely. <i>Tenacious memory.</i>
<u>tough</u>	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>Police have been getting tough with drivers.</i>
unbending	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. <i>An unbending will to dominate.</i>
unmalleable	Not malleable; inflexible, unbending, unadaptable.
unpersuadable	Not susceptible to persuasion. <i>He is absolutely unpersuadable on the subject of travel.</i>
<u>unshakeable</u>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>My unshakeable faith in the goodness of mankind.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Marked by firm determination or resolution; not shakable. <i>She fixed him with an unwavering stare.</i>
unyielding	Stubbornly unyielding T S Eliot. <i>His unyielding faith.</i>

determined	Having been learned or found or determined especially by investigation. <i>Made continued and determined efforts to find and destroy enemy headquarters.</i>
dour	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>The proverbially dour New England Puritan.</i>

firm	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>Holds a firm position as the country's leading poet.</i>
hard	Unfortunate or hard to bear. <i>The hard left.</i>
hidebound	Unwilling or unable to change because of tradition or convention. <i>They are working to change hidebound corporate cultures.</i>
inflexible	Not making concessions. <i>Heavy inflexible armour.</i>
intransigence	The trait of being intransigent; stubbornly refusing to compromise. <i>In the face of government intransigence he resigned in disgust.</i>
intransigent	An intransigent person. <i>Her father had tried persuasion but she was intransigent.</i>
monotheism	The doctrine or belief that there is only one God.
obduracy	Resoluteness by virtue of being unyielding and inflexible.
obdurate	Showing unfeeling resistance to tender feelings. <i>I argued this point with him but he was obdurate.</i>
obstinate	Tenaciously unwilling or marked by tenacious unwillingness to yield. <i>The obstinate problem of unemployment.</i>
pertinacious	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>The most vocal and pertinacious of all the critics.</i>
principled	(of a system or method) based on a given set of rules. <i>A coherent and principled approach.</i>
resolute	Firm in purpose or belief; characterized by firmness and determination. <i>Stood resolute against the enemy.</i>
resolved	Firmly determined to do something. <i>Mysteries solved and unsolved problems resolved and unresolved.</i>
rigid	A lorry which is not articulated. <i>A rigid strip of metal.</i>
rigidness	The physical property of being stiff and resisting bending.
rigour	Severity or strictness. <i>His analysis is lacking in rigour.</i>
severity	Used of the degree of something undesirable e.g. pain or weather. <i>Sentences should reflect the severity of the crime.</i>
stern	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. <i>The past year has been a stern test of the ability of British industry.</i>
stiff	In a stiff manner. <i>A long stiff climb up the bare hillside.</i>

strictly	With no exceptions; completely or absolutely. <i>Strictly speaking ham is a cured cooked leg of pork.</i>
stubborn	Having or showing dogged determination not to change one's attitude or position on something, especially in spite of good arguments or reasons to do so. <i>A stubborn infection.</i>
tenacious	Persisting in existence; not easily dispelled. <i>Tenacious memory.</i>
<u>tough</u>	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>Tough rucksacks for climbers.</i>
unbending	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. <i>An unbending will to dominate.</i>
<u>unwavering</u>	Not wavering; steady or resolute. <i>Unwavering loyalty.</i>
unyielding	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>An unyielding head support.</i>
