ego

The conscious mind.
*He needed a boost to his **ego**.*

id

A card or badge used to identify the bearer.
*The conflict between the drives of the **id** and the demands of the cultural superego.*

psyche

(Greek mythology) a beautiful princess loved by Cupid who visited her at night and told her she must not try to see him; became the personification of the soul.
*How does constant losing affect the **psyches** of young athletes.*

self

Used ironically to refer to oneself or someone else.
*To love in an unpossessive way implies the total surrender of **self**.*

subconscious

The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred.
*Uncertainties were lurking around the edge of her **subconscious**.*

subconscious mind Psychic activity just below the level of awareness.

- superego** That part of the unconscious mind that acts as a conscience.
*True schizophrenias lack the **superego** elements present in paranoia.*
- unconscious mind** That part of the mind wherein psychic activity takes place of which the person is unaware.



Usage Examples of "Unconscious" as a noun

- *Horrific apparitions surfaced out of the recesses of his unconscious.*



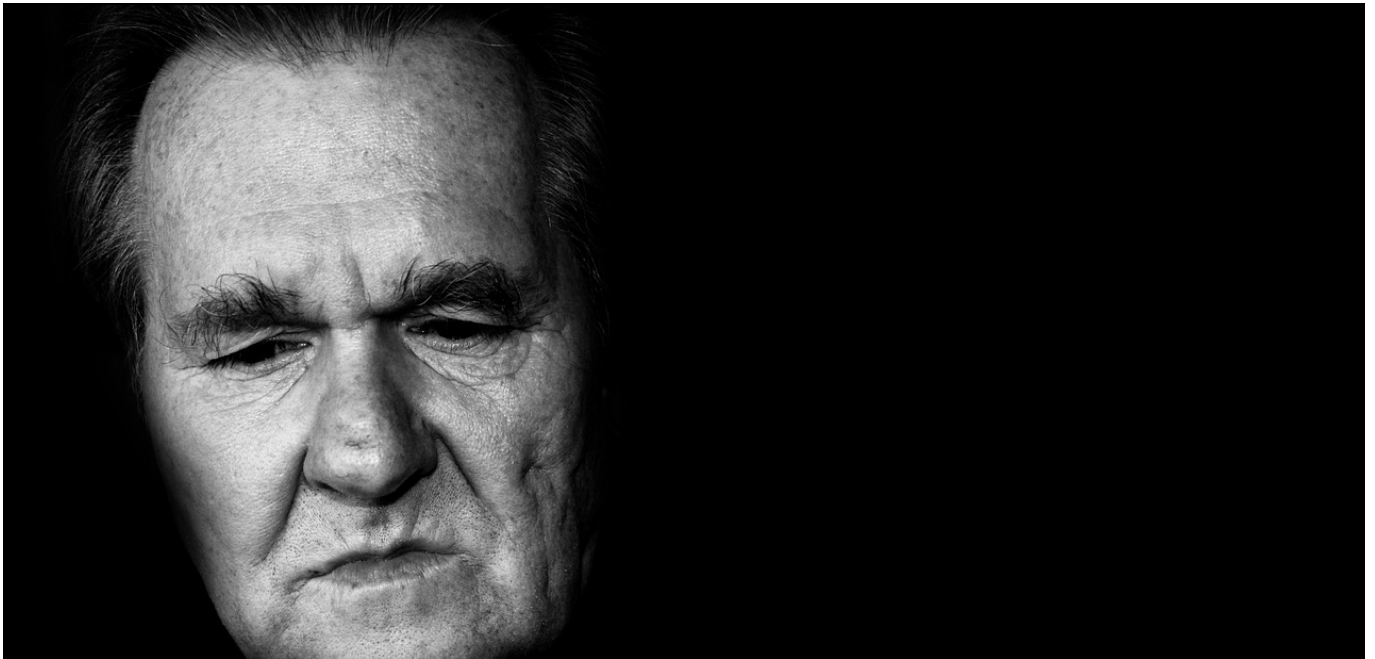
Unconscious as an Adjective

Definitions of "Unconscious" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "unconscious" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Without conscious volition.*
- *Not conscious; lacking awareness and the capacity for sensory perception as if asleep or dead.*
- *Not awake and aware of and responding to one's environment.*
- *(followed by `of') not knowing or perceiving.*

- *Not knowing or perceiving- Charles Dickens.*
- *Done or existing without one realizing.*
- *Unaware of.*



Synonyms of "Unconscious" as an adjective (20 Words)

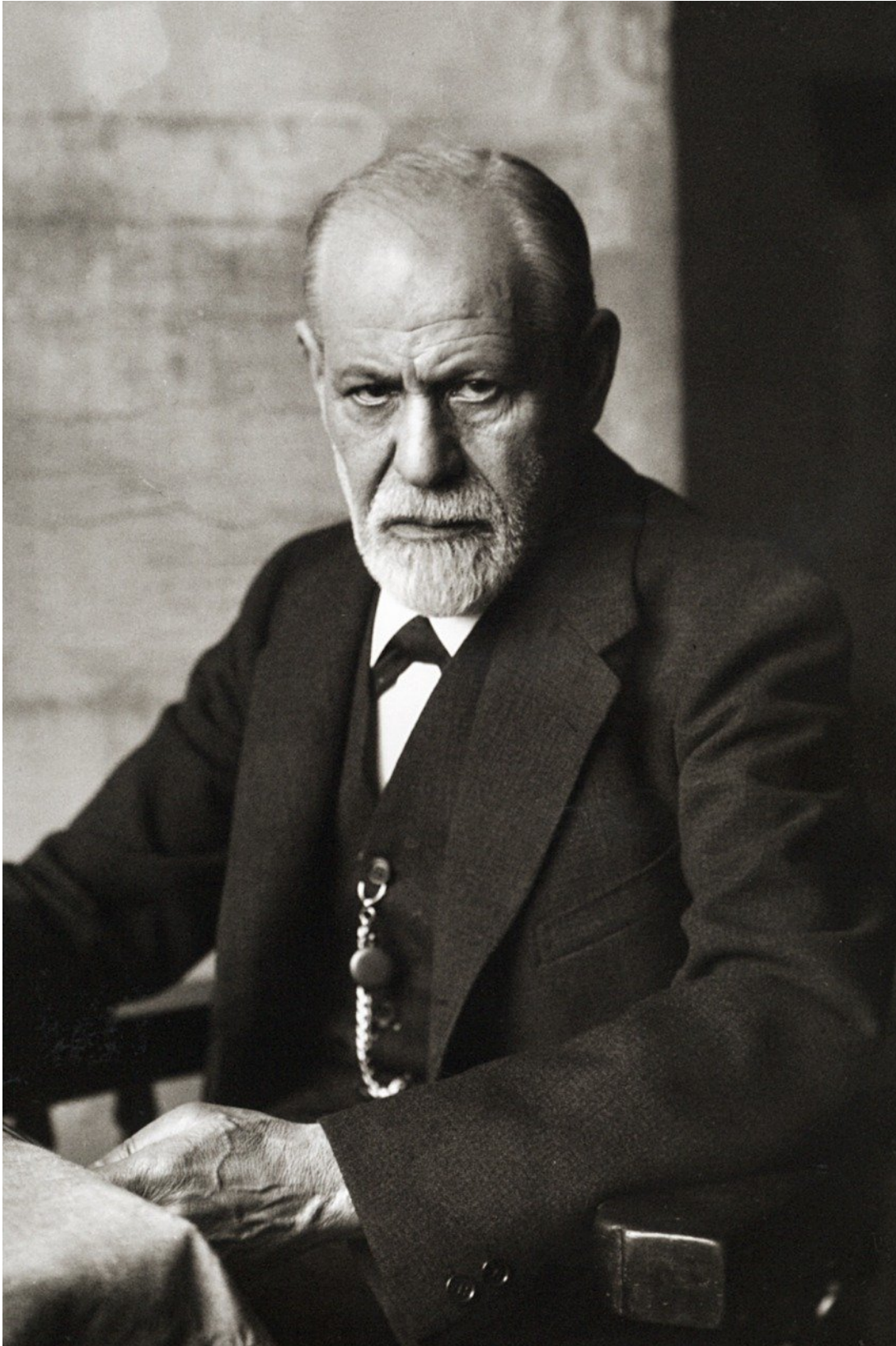
accidental	Incidental; subsidiary. <i>The character's motives remain accidental to the plot.</i>
comatose	Relating to or associated with a coma. <i>She lay comatose in the sun listening to a personal stereo.</i>
heedless	Marked by or paying little heed or attention. <i>Heedless of danger.</i>
in a coma	Holding office.
inadvertent	Happening by chance or unexpectedly or unintentionally. <i>An inadvertent administrative error occurred that resulted in an overpayment.</i>
<u>inert</u>	Lacking the ability or strength to move. <i>She lay inert in her bed.</i>
insensate	Lacking sympathy or compassion; unfeeling. <i>Insensate jabbering.</i>
insensible	Unresponsive to stimulation. <i>They slept on insensible to the headlight beams.</i>

insentient	Devoid of feeling and consciousness and animation. <i>It s arrogant to presume animals to be insentient.</i>
passed out	Of advancing the ball by throwing it.
senseless	(of especially persons) lacking sense or understanding or judgment. <i>Drugged and senseless.</i>
taking no notice	Very attractive; capturing interest.
unheeding	Not paying attention. <i>Mary unheeding watched the television.</i>
<u>unintended</u>	Not deliberate. <i>The unintended consequences of people s actions.</i>
<u>unintentional</u>	Without deliberate intent- George Macdonald. <i>An unintentional pun.</i>
unmindful	Not mindful or attentive- G.B.Shaw. <i>Danielle seemed unmindful of her parents plight.</i>
<u>unplanned</u>	Not done with purpose or intent. <i>Accepts an unplanned order.</i>
unpremeditated	Not prepared or planned in advance. <i>It was a totally unpremeditated attack.</i>
unthinking	Mentally sluggish. <i>She was at pains to correct unthinking prejudices.</i>
unwitting	(of a person) not aware of the full facts. <i>We are anxious to rectify the unwitting mistakes made in the past.</i>



Usage Examples of "Unconscious" as an adjective

- *The boy was beaten unconscious.*
- *Lay unconscious on the floor.*
- *Happily unconscious of the new calamity at home.*
- *He would wipe back his hair in an unconscious gesture of annoyance.*
- *'What is it?' he said again, unconscious of the repetition.*



Associations of "Unconscious" (30 Words)

accidental	(in Aristotelian thought) relating to or denoting properties which are not essential to a thing's nature. <i>Horn parts are usually written without key signature the necessary accidentals being added.</i>
anesthetic	Characterized by insensibility. <i>The young girls are in a state of possession blind and deaf and anesthetic.</i>
blind	Make blind by putting the eyes out. <i>She was blind to the realities of her position.</i>
blunt	Make dull or blunt. <i>Blunt the knives.</i>
coma	(botany) a usually terminal tuft of bracts (as in the pineapple) or tuft of hairs (especially on certain seeds). <i>She went into a coma.</i>
comatose	Relating to or in a state of coma. <i>She had been comatose for seven months.</i>
faint	(of a sight, smell, or sound) barely perceptible. <i>Suddenly felt faint from the pain.</i>
freezing	The freezing point of water 0 C. <i>Strong winds and freezing temperatures.</i>
hospital	A hospice, especially one run by the Knights Hospitaller. <i>Christ's Hospital.</i>
ignorant	Uneducated in the fundamentals of a given art or branch of learning; lacking knowledge of a specific field. <i>This ignorant pin brained receptionist.</i>
insensible	(of a person or bodily extremity) without feeling; numb. <i>Insensible to the suffering around him.</i>
limbo	An imaginary place for lost or neglected things. <i>The legal battle could leave the club in limbo until next year.</i>
numb	Make numb or insensitive. <i>Vodka might numb the pain in my hand.</i>
oblivious	Not aware of or concerned about what is happening around one. <i>Oblivious to the risks she ran.</i>
paralyzed	Affected with paralysis.
senseless	Unresponsive to stimulation. <i>A senseless act.</i>

silly	Lacking seriousness; given to frivolity. <i>Come on silly.</i>
stun	Hit something or somebody as if with a sandbag. <i>The man was stunned by a blow to the head.</i>
<u>subconscious</u>	The subconscious part of the mind not in technical use in psychoanalysis where unconscious is preferred. <i>My subconscious fear.</i>
<u>unaware</u>	(often followed by `of') not aware. <i>Seemed unaware of the scrutiny.</i>
unconsciously	Without awareness. <i>Ben smiled unconsciously when he heard her voice.</i>
<u>unintended</u>	Not deliberate. <i>The unintended consequences of people s actions.</i>
<u>unintentional</u>	Not done on purpose. <i>The offense was unintentional.</i>
unknown	Being or having an unknown or unnamed source. <i>An unknown source.</i>
unmindful	Not conscious or aware. <i>Danielle seemed unmindful of her parents plight.</i>
<u>unwillingly</u>	In an unwilling manner. <i>He unwillingly went back to the family business in the City.</i>
unwitting	Unaware because of a lack of relevant information or knowledge. <i>An unwitting mistake may be overlooked.</i>
witless	(of especially persons) lacking sense or understanding or judgment. <i>I was scared witless.</i>
