| <b>lack of feeling</b>   | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.   |
| <b>lack of sensation</b> | The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.   |
| <b><u>oblivion</u></b>   | The state of being unaware or unconscious of what is happening around one.<br><i>His name will fade into <b>oblivion</b>.</i> |
| <b>senselessness</b>     | Total lack of meaning or ideas.   |
| <b>stupefaction</b>      | The state of being stupefied.<br><i>Salesmen stood in bored <b>stupefaction</b>.</i>  |

**unawareness**      Unconsciousness resulting from lack of knowledge or attention.



### **Usage Examples of "Unconsciousness" as a noun**

- *Someone gave me a crack across the head and I slipped into unconsciousness.*
- *Part of her beauty was her unconsciousness of it.*

- analgesia**      The inability to feel pain.  
*She was able to take **analgesia** orally.*
- blunder**        A stupid or careless mistake.  
*He **blundered** his stupid ideas.*
- botch**            Make a mess of, destroy or ruin.  
*I **botched** the dinner and we had to eat out.*
- carelessness**    Failure to act with the prudence that a reasonable person would exercise under the same circumstances.  
*Most road accidents are caused by **carelessness** on the part of motorists.*

| <b>coma</b>         | (botany) a usually terminal tuft of bracts (as in the pineapple) or tuft of hairs (especially on certain seeds).<br><i>After the film I settled into a <b>coma</b>.</i> |
| <b>defect</b>       | A shortcoming, imperfection, or lack.<br><i>Genetic <b>defects</b>.</i>   |
| <b>defective</b>    | Imperfect or faulty.<br><i>A <b>defective</b> appliance.</i>  |
| <b>deficiency</b>   | A lack or shortage.<br><i>A budget <b>deficiency</b> of 96 billion.</i>   |

| <b>error</b>        | A wrong action attributable to bad judgment or ignorance or inattention.<br><i>Goods dispatched to your branch in <b>error</b>.</i>                                     |
| <b>failing</b>      | Below acceptable in performance.<br><i>He was quick to point out his wife s <b>failings</b>.</i>  |
| <b>fallible</b>     | Likely to fail or make errors.<br><i>I m only a <b>fallible</b> human.</i>  |
| <b>fault</b>        | Of a rock formation be broken by a fault or faults.<br><i>The continental crust has been thinned and <b>faulted</b> as a result of geological processes.</i>            |
| <b>flaw</b>         | Add a flaw or blemish to make imperfect or defective.<br><i>The computer game was <b>flawed</b> by poor programming.</i>  |
| <b>flawed</b>       | (of a person) having a weakness in character.<br><i>A fatally <b>flawed</b> strategy.</i>   |
| <b>gaffe</b>        | An unintentional act or remark causing embarrassment to its originator; a blunder.<br><i>In my first few months at work I made some real <b>gaffes</b>.</i>             |
| <b>imperfect</b>    | The imperfect tense.<br><i><b>Imperfect</b> mortals.</i>  |
| <b>inadvertence</b> | The trait of forgetting or ignoring your responsibilities.  |
| <b>lapse</b>        | Drop to a lower level, as in one's morals or standards.<br><i>A <b>lapse</b> of three weeks between letters.</i>  |
| <b>misconceive</b>  | Judge or plan badly, typically on the basis of faulty understanding.<br><i>Some academic latinists did <b>misconceive</b> Pound s poem in that way.</i>                 |

| <b>misconstrue</b>             | Interpret (a person's words or actions) wrongly.<br><i>She <b>misconstrued</b> my remarks.</i>  |
| <b>mistake</b>                 | To make a mistake or be incorrect.<br><i>Make no <b>mistake</b> about his intentions.</i>   |
| <b><u>misunderstanding</u></b> | A failure to understand something correctly.<br><i>He left the army after a slight <b>misunderstanding</b> with his commanding officer.</i> |
| <b><u>obscurity</u></b>        | The state of being unknown, inconspicuous, or unimportant.<br><i>He is too good a player to slide into <b>obscurity</b>.</i>                |
| <b>oversight</b>               | A mistake resulting from inattention.<br><i>Was the mistake due to <b>oversight</b>.</i>  |
| <b>slip</b>                    | A slippery smoothness.<br><i>You're <b>slipping</b> Doyle you need a holiday.</i>   |
| <b>solecism</b>                | A breach of good manners; an instance of incorrect behaviour.   |
