| incorrigible | Impervious to correction by punishment. An incorrigible mess. |

| recalcitrant | Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>The University suspended the most recalcitrant demonstrators.</i> |
| refractory | (of a person or animal) resistant to infection. <i>Healing of previously refractory ulcers.</i> |
| turbulent | (of air or water) moving unsteadily or violently. <i>Turbulent rapids.</i> |
| uncontainable | (especially of an emotion) very strong. <i>His uncontainable enthusiasm.</i> |
| uncorrectable | Incapable of being controlled or managed. <i>An uncorrectable habit.</i> |
| undisciplined | Lacking in discipline or control. <i>Undisciplined soldiers.</i> |
| ungovernable | Incapable of being controlled. <i>An ungovernable impulse to run away.</i> |
| unmanageable | Incapable of being controlled or managed. <i>An unmanageable situation.</i> |
| unquenchable | Not able to be quenched. <i>His enthusiasm was unquenchable.</i> |
| unruly | Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A group of unruly children.</i> |
| unstoppable | Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>As unstoppable as the wind.</i> |
| wild | Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>Wild talk.</i> |

| boisterous | Noisy, energetic, and cheerful. <i>A group of boisterous lads.</i> |
| disorderly | Lacking organization; untidy. <i>His life was as disorderly as ever.</i> |
| fanatic | A person filled with excessive and single-minded zeal, especially for an extreme religious or political cause. <i>His eyes had a fanatic iciness.</i> |

| fierce | Having or displaying an intense or ferocious aggressiveness. <i>Fierce fighting.</i> |
| incorrigible | An incorrigible person. <i>She s an incorrigible flirt.</i> |
| insubordinate | Not submissive to authority. <i>Insubordinate boys.</i> |
| intractable | Hard to control or deal with. <i>Intractable metal.</i> |
| invade | Enter (a place, situation, or sphere of activity) in large numbers, especially with intrusive effect. <i>Demonstrators invaded the Presidential Palace.</i> |
| irrepressible | Not able to be controlled or restrained. <i>An irrepressible rogue.</i> |
| obstreperous | Noisy and difficult to control. <i>The boy is cocky and obstreperous.</i> |
| rambunctious | Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A rambunctious tyke.</i> |
| rampage | Violently angry and destructive behavior. <i>Several thousand demonstrators rampaged through the city.</i> |

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| recalcitrant | Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>A class of recalcitrant fifteen year olds.</i> |
| refractory | (of a substance) resistant to heat; hard to melt or fuse. <i>A refractory case of acne.</i> |
| resistive | Able to withstand the action or effect of something. |
| savage | Without civilizing influences. <i>The mother of one of the victims has described his assailants as savages.</i> |
| tempestuous | As if showing violent anger. <i>A tempestuous wind.</i> |
| uncivilized | Impolite; bad-mannered. <i>Children are basically uncivilized.</i> |
| ungovernable | Impossible to control or govern. <i>An ungovernable impulse to run away.</i> |
| unruly | Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>The little boy s parents think he is spirited but his teacher finds him unruly.</i> |
| untamed | In a natural state; not tamed or domesticated or cultivated. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild untamed landscape.</i> |
| vehemence | The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>The vehemence of his reaction.</i> |
| vehement | Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions; inclined to react violently; fervid. <i>A vehement defense.</i> |
| violent | Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>Violent passions.</i> |
| wild | Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>Performing in Hollywood was beyond my wildest dreams.</i> |
