<b>out of control</b>	No longer fashionable.
<b>recalcitrant</b>	Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>The University suspended the most <b>recalcitrant</b> demonstrators.</i>
<b>refractory</b>	(of a person or animal) resistant to infection. <i>Healing of previously <b>refractory</b> ulcers.</i>
<b>turbulent</b>	(of air or water) moving unsteadily or violently. <i><b>Turbulent</b> rapids.</i>
<b>uncontainable</b>	(especially of an emotion) very strong. <i>His <b>uncontainable</b> enthusiasm.</i>
<b>uncorrectable</b>	Incapable of being controlled or managed. <i>An <b>uncorrectable</b> habit.</i>
<b>undisciplined</b>	Lacking in discipline or control. <i><b>Undisciplined</b> soldiers.</i>
<b>ungovernable</b>	Incapable of being controlled. <i>An <b>ungovernable</b> impulse to run away.</i>
<b>unmanageable</b>	Incapable of being controlled or managed. <i>An <b>unmanageable</b> situation.</i>
<b>unquenchable</b>	Not able to be quenched. <i>His enthusiasm was <b>unquenchable</b>.</i>
<b>unruly</b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A group of <b>unruly</b> children.</i>
<b>unstoppable</b>	Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>As <b>unstoppable</b> as the wind.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i><b>Wild</b> talk.</i>

<b>barbaric</b>	Unrestrained and crudely rich. <i>The <b>barbaric</b> splendour he found in civilizations since destroyed.</i>

<b>incorrigible</b>	An incorrigible person. <i>She s an <b>incorrigible</b> flirt.</i>
<b>insubordinate</b>	Not submissive to authority. <i><b>Insubordinate</b> boys.</i>
<b>intractable</b>	Hard to control or deal with. <i><b>Intractable</b> metal.</i>
<b>invade</b>	Enter (a place, situation, or sphere of activity) in large numbers, especially with intrusive effect. <i>Demonstrators <b>invaded</b> the Presidential Palace.</i>
<b>irrepressible</b>	Not able to be controlled or restrained. <i>An <b>irrepressible</b> rogue.</i>
<b>obstreperous</b>	Noisy and difficult to control. <i>The boy is cocky and <b>obstreperous</b>.</i>
<b>rambunctious</b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A <b>rambunctious</b> tyke.</i>
<b>rampage</b>	Violently angry and destructive behavior. <i>Several thousand demonstrators <b>rampaged</b> through the city.</i>

<b>recalcitrant</b>	Having an obstinately uncooperative attitude towards authority or discipline. <i>A class of <b>recalcitrant</b> fifteen year olds.</i>
<b>refractory</b>	(of a substance) resistant to heat; hard to melt or fuse. <i>A <b>refractory</b> case of acne.</i>
<b>resistive</b>	Able to withstand the action or effect of something.
<b>savage</b>	Without civilizing influences. <i>The mother of one of the victims has described his assailants as <b>savages</b>.</i>
<b>tempestuous</b>	As if showing violent anger. <i>A <b>tempestuous</b> wind.</i>
<b>uncivilized</b>	Impolite; bad-mannered. <i>Children are basically <b>uncivilized</b>.</i>
<b>ungovernable</b>	Impossible to control or govern. <i>An <b>ungovernable</b> impulse to run away.</i>
<b>unruly</b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>The little boy s parents think he is spirited but his teacher finds him <b>unruly</b>.</i>
<b>untamed</b>	In a natural state; not tamed or domesticated or cultivated. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild <b>untamed</b> landscape.</i>
<b>vehemence</b>	The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>The <b>vehemence</b> of his reaction.</i>
<b>vehement</b>	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions; inclined to react violently; fervid. <i>A <b>vehement</b> defense.</i>
<b>violent</b>	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i><b>Violent</b> passions.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>Performing in Hollywood was beyond my <b>wildest</b> dreams.</i>
