## Unconvincing as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Unconvincing" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “unconvincing” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Failing to impress.*
- *Not convincing.*
- *Having a probability too low to inspire belief.*
- *Failing to make someone believe that something is true or valid.*

### Synonyms of "Unconvincing" as an adjective (5 Words)

<b>flimsy</b>	Lacking solidity or strength. <i>The <b>flimsy</b> garment fell from her.</i>
<b>implausible</b>	(of an argument or statement) not seeming reasonable or probable; failing to convince. <i>Gave the teacher an <b>implausible</b> excuse.</i>
<b>improbable</b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>An <b>improbable</b> event.</i>
<b><a href="#">unbelievable</a></b>	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>Your audacity is <b>unbelievable</b>.</i>

**unlikely** Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred.  
*It is **unlikely** that they will ever be used.*

## Usage Examples of "Unconvincing" as an adjective

- *As unconvincing as a forced smile.*
- *She felt the lie was unconvincing.*
- *A slightly bizarre and unconvincing fusion of musical forces.*

## Associations of "Unconvincing" (30 Words)

<b>amaze</b>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. <i>He has been <b>amazed</b> by the quality of the employees at the bank.</i>
<b>amazing</b>	Very impressive; excellent. <i>She makes the most <b>amazing</b> cakes.</i>
<b>astonish</b>	Affect with wonder. <i>You never fail to <b>astonish</b> me.</i>
<b>astonishing</b>	Surprising greatly. <i>Such an enormous response was <b>astonishing</b>.</i>
<b>astound</b>	Shock or greatly surprise. <i>Her bluntness <b>astounded</b> him.</i>
<b>astounding</b>	Bewildering or striking dumb with wonder. <i>The summit offers <b>astounding</b> views.</i>
<b>doubtful</b>	Fraught with uncertainty or doubt. <i>Of <b>doubtful</b> legality.</i>
<b>fabulous</b>	Very good; wonderful. <i><b>Fabulous</b> riches.</i>
<b>farfetched</b>	Highly imaginative but unlikely. <i>A <b>farfetched</b> excuse.</i>
<b>implausible</b>	Highly imaginative but unlikely. <i>Gave the teacher an <b>implausible</b> excuse.</i>
<b>impossible</b>	(of a person) very unreasonable. <i>An <b>impossible</b> dream.</i>
<b>improbable</b>	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>The characters have <b>improbable</b> names.</i>
<b>inconceivable</b>	Totally unlikely. <i>They behaved with <b>inconceivable</b> cruelty.</i>

<b>incredible</b>	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>I was mesmerized she looked so <b>incredible</b>.</i>
<b><u>marvelous</u></b>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A <b>marvelous</b> collection of rare books.</i>
<b><u>miraculous</u></b>	Of the nature of a miracle or having the power to work miracles. <i>A <b>miraculous</b> cure.</i>
<b>miraculously</b>	In a way that suggests or resembles a miracle. <i>The two drivers <b>miraculously</b> escaped with only minor injuries.</i>
<b>profound</b>	Profound quality. <i><b>Profound</b> social changes.</i>
<b>redoubtable</b>	(of a person) formidable, especially as an opponent. <i>A tougher and more <b>redoubtable</b> adversary than the heel clicking jackbooted fanatic.</i>
<b><u>staggering</u></b>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The amount of money required was <b>staggering</b>.</i>
<b><u>supposed</u></b>	Doubtful or suspect. <i>The <b>supposed</b> reason for his absence.</i>
<b><u>surprising</u></b>	Causing surprise; unexpected. <i>She earned a <b>surprising</b> amount of money.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was <b>unacceptable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unbelievable</u></b>	Not able to be believed; unlikely to be true. <i><b>Unbelievable</b> or not it happened.</i>
<b>unimaginable</b>	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost <b>unimaginable</b> deprivation.</i>
<b><u>unlikely</u></b>	Has little chance of being the case or coming about. <i>An <b>unlikely</b> candidate for reelection.</i>
<b>unreliable</b>	Not worthy of reliance or trust. <i>In the early 1950s computers were large and expensive and <b>unreliable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unthinkable</u></b>	(of a situation or event) too unlikely or undesirable to be considered a possibility. <i>The <b>unthinkable</b> happened I spoke up.</i>
<b>untrustworthy</b>	Not worthy of trust or belief. <i>An <b>untrustworthy</b> person.</i>
<b>wonderful</b>	Extraordinarily good or great ; used especially as intensifiers. <i>They all think she s <b>wonderful</b>.</i>
