
## **Under as an Adjective**

- An under secretary.






## **Under as an Adverb**

- Down to defeat, death, or ruin.
- In or into a state of subordination or subjugation.
- Below the horizon.
- Through a range downward.
- Affected by an anaesthetic; unconscious.
- Further down.
- Below some quantity or limit.
- Extending or directly below something.
- Into unconsciousness.






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### Synonyms of "Under" as an adverb (6 Words)

<u>below</u>	Below deck. Our nutritionist is pictured <b>below</b> right.
<u>beneath</u>	At a lower level or layer. A house built on stilts to allow air to circulate <b>beneath</b> .
<u>down</u>	Downstairs. I ll put you <b>down</b> for the evening shift.
downward	Spatially or metaphorically from a higher to a lower level or position. <i>Prices plunged <b>downward</b></i> .
lower	In or into a lower position. <i>The sun sank <b>lower</b>.</i>
underneath	On the lower or downward side; on the underside of.

Paint was peeling off in flakes to reveal greyish plaster **underneath**.





#### Usage Examples of "Under" as an adverb

- Weaving the body through the crossbars, over and under, over and under.
- The operation was quick; she was only under for 15 minutes.
- See under for further discussion.
- *He was floating for some time but suddenly went under.*

abase	I watched my colleagues abasing themselves before the board of trustees.
adulterate	Mixed with impurities. <i>Adulterate</i> remedies.
andiron	A metal stand, typically one of a pair, for supporting wood burning in a fireplace. <i>The <b>andiron</b>s were too hot to touch.</i>
<u>base</u>	Of low birth or station base is archaic in this sense. A <b>base</b> degrading way of life.
<u>belittle</u>	Express a negative opinion of. Don t <b>belittle</b> your colleagues.
<u>below</u>	See below. See <b>below</b> .
<u>beneath</u>	At a lower level or layer. A house built on stilts to allow air to circulate <b>beneath</b> .
bottom	Situated at the bottom or lowest position. The books on the <b>bottom</b> shelf.
condescend	Treat condescendingly. Take care not to <b>condescend</b> to your reader.
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The love episodes <b>debase</b> the dignity of the drama.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. The aisles were <b>decrease</b> d in height.
degrade	Lower the quality of; cause to deteriorate. She thought that many supposedly erotic pictures <b>degrade</b> d women.
demoralize	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. She hastened her daughter s steps lest she be <b>demoralize</b> d by beholding the free manners of these mad English.
<u>demote</u>	Move (someone) to a lower position or rank, usually as a punishment. The head of the army was <b>demote</b> d to deputy defence secretary.
descending	Moving or sloping downwards. The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.
<u>down</u>	Downstairs. You got to be <b>down</b> with me.



downgrade	Reduce to a lower grade, rank, or level of importance. <b>Downgrades</b> by debt rating agencies outnumber upgrades by five to one.
<u>hidden</u>	Difficult to find. Concealed or <b>hidden</b> damage.
irreducible	Incapable of being made smaller or simpler. Literature is often <b>irreducible</b> to normative ideas.
low	Very low in volume. The dual traditions of high and <b>low</b> art.
<u>lower</u>	Move something or somebody to a lower position. <i>The <b>lower</b> levels of the building.</i>
<u>minimize</u>	Represent as less significant or important. They may <b>minimize</b> or even overlook the importance of such beliefs.
mortify	Hold within limits and control. They wish to return to heaven by <b>mortify</b> ing the flesh.
nether	Located below or beneath something else. The ballast is suspended from its <b>nether</b> end.
reduce	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>Reduce</i> an image.
submergence	Sinking until covered completely with water. Total <b>submergence</b> of plants results in heavy crop losses.
subnormal	Not meeting standards or reaching a level regarded as usual. When you lose enough body heat to make your temperature <b>subnormal</b> you become hypothermic.
<u>substrate</u>	A material which provides the surface on which something is deposited or inscribed, for example the silicon wafer used to manufacture integrated circuits. <i>The Celtic languages of Britain are a</i> <b>substrate</b> <i>for English.</i>
<u>underneath</u>	Situated directly below something else. A wart on the <b>underneath</b> of his foot.
underside	The bottom or lower side or surface of something. The butterfly s wings have a mottled brown pattern on the <b>underside</b> .
